Death Finally Gets Austrian

Third Time Succeeds in Claiming Man's Life

EUGENE, Ore., June 5.—(P)—John Parich, 40, an Austrian by birth, died in a local hospital yesterday as the result of an accident in Portland a month ago. According to the story he told here, he was buried under an avalanche of lumber in a Portland mill yard. The accident had been his third major one in recent years. One time he fell 150 feet down a mine shaft and was seriously hurt, but recovered. At another time he was

buried alive in a mine cave-in and was without food or water for six days and nights. An estate of about \$4000 will be sent to his sisters, the only surviving relatives, in Jugo-Slavia.

Mine Strikers in Britain Confident

BRUSSELS, June 5.—(P)—Confidence in the ability of the coal miners to intensify the effect of the strike in Great Britain was expressed at the opening of an emergency meeting of the International miners' federation here today. The meeting was called to obtain increased support from the Continental miners, both in the form of money and the prevention of coal shipments to Britain.

House Jangles 14 Hours Over River Measure

No Final Vote Taken; Thirty-six Million Asked in Bill

WASHINGTON, June 4 (P)—After fighting continuously for 14 hours over the \$36,000,000 omnibus river and harbors bill, the house completed reading of the measure shortly after 1 o'clock this morning and adjourned without taking a final vote.

Completion of the reading of the bill brought it close to the point where it can be taken up for final passage. Leaders hope to get this action later today, after the house reassembles at noon.

Bedlam prevailed during much of the bitter struggle over the bill, and the session today was one of the longest in recent history of the house. Seldom, except on the eve of adjournment of a session, has the chamber remained on the job after midnight.

Surveys in Oregon approved include: Coquille river, from entrance to Bullards; Yaquina river from Toledo to Yaquina Bay; Clatskanie river from Clatskanie to Channel in the Columbia river; Willamette river between Portland and Salem and the Tillamook Bay and entrance.

Among the projects approved was one authorizing the expenditure of \$1,253,000 or \$700,000 more than now authorized, for improvements of Umpqua harbor and river, Oregon, with an annual maintenance of \$50,000.

FLOUR DROPS

PORTLAND, Ore., June 5.—(P)—A decline of 20 cents in family patent flour and 40 cents a barrel in bakers' grades is effective in the local market. New price on patents is \$8.40 with bakers' grades ranging from \$7.80 to \$8.80 a barrel.

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Slight Change For Better In Wool Situation

Prices Not Up; Trade Still Reflects Pessimism.

BOSTON, June 5.—(P)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say:

"Whether the better weather is responsible or not is not clear, but there is a slight improvement in the demand for wool and the attitude of the trade is more specific, although prices are not improved any, as yet, and some members of the trade are still pessimistic. The export movement is expanding. London opened about as expected and has been fairly steady through the week, with finer wools very firm. The Australian season ended strong at Brisbane Wednesday.

"In the West, wool moves slowly but steadily as shown at prices slightly under the recent high levels, say one to two cents on the average in the grease. Wools offered at sealed bid sales in Texas have been withdrawn, prices considered too low by growers.

"Repeat orders come forward very slowly from the goods market. There is a slight improvement, however, which has been most noticeable in woolen goods, but this trade has been well scattered.

Strawberries Gone; High Prices Asked

PORTLAND, Ore., June 5.—(P)—The 1926 strawberry crop is practically sold, almost a month earlier than usual. There were only a few berries available on the early market and they went promptly at \$2.35 to \$2.75 a crate. Growers report that they are through with the strawberry harvest and are now busy with raspberries and loganberries.

Raspberries brought \$2.25 to \$2.50 a crate on the early market today with black caps as high as \$3. Loganberries were plentiful at \$1.25 to 1.50 a crate.

Chiloquin Plans 4th Celebration

\$2,000 Raised by Business Men For Project

CHILOQUIN, Ore., June 5.—A gigantic celebration will be held in Chiloquin on July 3, 4 and 5 according to plans of local business men who met at the hotel Halfour to discuss the proposition. Nearly \$2000 has been raised locally. The meeting was presided over by Police Judge Farmer, who appointed several committees to look after the work. Among the several features planned are a big rodeo, horses for which have already been secured, an Indian war dance, prize fight, airplane, dances, races, games, log rolling, public speaking, brass bands, etc.

Every effort will be made to make this one of the biggest celebrations ever held in southern Oregon. Mr. Bartlett, local merchant, who has had wide experience in conducting celebrations, was named by Judge Farmer to be chairman of the celebration committee, and marshal of the day, and it is safe to say that under Mr. Bartlett's management the big affair will be a success. It is reported that special arrangements will be made to care for out of town visitors, and as Chiloquin has a surplus of good restaurants there will be no trouble to feed all those who come to celebrate. The city council will be asked to appoint about 15 special police to act during the celebration.

Large circus sized bills are being printed at the local printing office announcing the celebration and these will be distributed all over southern Oregon inviting everyone to come.

Consistent with its announced desire to make Chiloquin a clean town and keep it clean the city authorities this week ordered several under-

drable women who had slipped in town to get out.

The city authorities requested and have received permission from Superintendent Arnold of the Indian Reservation to use the government jail here for local prisoners. The city now has a well organized city government, an efficient marshal and deputy and a

good jail, and outsiders who have no legitimate line of business are steering shy of this city.
