Blaze at Lorenz Plumbing Shop Stopped by Fire Department

Sam Konnie, an employee of the Lorenz Company, was painfully injured about ten o'clock this morning when a 20 gallon gasoline storage tank, which he was attempting to solder at the plumbing shop on Sixth street, exploded with terrific force.

An alarm was turned in and the fire department rushed engine No. 1 to the scene but no blaze resulted from the explosion.

Konnie was caught on the right leg by the full force of the blast when gas fumes ignited in the empty tank and blew out the end. He was rushed to the Klamath Valley Hospital and an examination disclosed no serious injury outside of a painful bruise.

Joe Miller Is Under Arrest; Liquor Charge

Charged with violating the liquor laws on the Klamath Indian reservation, Joe Miller was arrested yesterday by Deputy United States Marshal C. C. Wells. Miller had been secretly indicted by a federal grand jury in Portland. He produced a \$1500 bond and was allowed to return to his home on the reservation.

Fred Nephews was arrested on a charge of distributing liquor to Indians and unable to raise a \$2,000 bond set by United States Commissioner Bert C. Thomas, was taken to Portland this afternoon by Wells.

One of the stiffest sentences meted out in justice court in months was dealt this morning to John Johanson, known in bootlegging circles as "Alaska John" when

he was fined \$500 and sentenced to serve 60 days in jail by Justice of the Peace R. A. Emmitt.

It was Johanson's third offense. He was arrested on a charge of possession of liquor Saturday night.

Frances Morgan and D. D. Walker arrested in a house on Eighth and Plum streets, were each fined \$100 following their pleas of guilty to possession of liquor.
