Nobody Held to Blame for Fatal Accident Sunday

Alden Foote Whitney came to his death as the result of an unavoidable accident.

This was the decision late yesterday afternoon of a coroner's jury following an inquest conducted by Henry V. Joyaux, deputy county coroner. Foote was killed early Sunday morning when the car in which he was riding plunged off a highway fill on the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway.

Coroner's jury was composed of J. G. Goble, J. E. Swanson, James Blair, J. I. Johnson, G. B. Fife and J. A. Uerling. Witnesses examined were State Traffic Officer W. A. Foster, Karl G. Kimball, driver of

the ill fated car and Dr. J. G. Patterson. Remains were sent this morning to Ashland, Whitney's former home, where funeral services and interment will be conducted.

VITRIFIED PIPE TO BE USED IN 8TH SEWER UNIT

Concrete Pipe Turned Down Despite Contractor's Preference

A petition signed by 410 property owners in the Eighth sewer unit district in Fairview demanding the installing of vitrified glazed sewer pipe in the new project instead of concrete pipe, was granted by the city council last night.

W. D. Miller, contractor in charge of this project which is just getting under way, voiced a preference for the concrete pipe, stating that such pipe came in longer lengths, could be laid more easily and more quickly by hand and was entirely practical since it would come up to the same tests as the glazed pipe.

Two councilmen voted in favor of the concrete pipe but three members expressed a preference for the glazed pipe.

According to specifications of the eighth sewer project, the contractor is bound to use either concrete or glazed pipe.

To Remain Here

Fire Chief Keith Ambrose turned down a chance to attend the fire protection school at Corvallis on June 21 to 24. "Owing to the extreme hazards which exist here at this time, I feel that I would be needed here more than a school," Ambrose stated. "There will be another meeting of this kind in October and conditions will probably be favorable enough at that time so that I can attend," he concluded.

Mayor Goddard stated that a number of small buildings in the vicinity of the Hot Springs court house building were standing in the street, and property owners in that vicinity were objecting. The matter was turned over to the street committee for disposal.

A petition was presented for a new paving unit on Spring and "Wall" streets between Esplanade and Main. The city engineer was instructed to proceed with drawing up plans and specifications for this new work just as soon as the interested property owners put up the necessary \$150 to pay engineering costs.

Dwellings Are Threatened by Big Brush Fire

Fanned by a strong north wind, a brush fire threatened a residential section of the Shippington district last night between 7 and 8 o'clock. Herculean efforts on the part of fire fighters aided by fortunate change in the wind stemmed the advance of the flames.

Smoke interfered with work of fire fighters. Several homes were saved by the fire department, by liberal use of chemicals. The home of Clyde Howard, was nearly sur-

rounded by flames.

By back firing, the flames were diverted from a number of houses. Telephone and Power company poles were burned by the flames. Hundreds of people flocked to the blaze, some aiding in stemming the fire and others just to watch. The fire covered approximately 50 acres.

Hospital to Be Built Here Soon

Construction of a \$5,000 isolation hospital in Klamath Falls this summer was indicated late yesterday afternoon following a conference between three city councilmen, a chamber of commerce committee and members of the Klamath county health unit with the county court.

Cooperation in the project was offered by Judge Bunnell who stated that the county would be willing to meet half the cost of the hospital and pay for one half the maintenance.

Present at the meeting were Councilmen Roberts, Baisfiger, and Stucky; J. A. Gordon, Fred Fleet and R. C. Groesbeck; and Dr. G. S. Newsom, medical director of the health unit and County Health Nurse Lydia Fricke.

ONE KILLED IN GRANTS PASS AS PLANE CRASHES

GRANTS PASS, Ore., June 8.—(P)—When the airplane in which he was a passenger crashed to the ground here last evening about 8 o'clock, Ernest Willard Phelps, 20, was killed. Earl Titus, the pilot, was seriously injured. The plane fell only a few hundred feet. Titus had been running a passenger plane here for several days, having purchased the plane which had been wrecked at Crescent City, California, last fall. He repaired it and was using it commercially. He had just started on a flight when the plane turned over and crashed. It narrowly missed a house in the residence section of the city, landing in a street.
