\$47,076.72 in improvement bonds to the Umpqua Valley bank of Roseburg. Six bids were submitted ranging in rate from \$102.53 to \$104.80 per \$100 of bonds. The winning bid carried a premium of \$2,259.68 and accrued interest to date.

LONDON, June 9.—(AP)—Vera, Countess of Cathcart, is to be married next week to Gideon Boissevain, member of a Dutch-American family of bankers, it is reported.

The Daily Graphic is authority for the assertion and quotes both Mr. Boissevain and Countess Cathcart in verification. Mr. Boissevain is declared to have said that he met Lady Cathcart in New York last winter when he attended the premiere of her play, "Ashes of Love." He described his courtship as a pure romance and added: "We have already got the engagement ring and the marriage takes place next week."

Countess Cathcart is described by the newspaper as saying that although Mr. Boissevain looks like an Englishman, he is an American, and as having added, "Oh, I shall be an American too."

The groom to be is 25 years of age and is well known in English society. He often has been called the best dressed man in London.

Another Alleged D'Autremont Is Found; Released

BEND, Ore., June 9.—(AP)—Sheriff S. E. Roberts announced late yesterday that a suspect he was holding because of resemblance to Roy D'Autremont, alleged dynamiter of a Southern Pacific mail car and murderer, has proved not to be the fugitive. Postal Inspector Limebaugh was here yesterday and after seeing the prisoner, declared he was not D'Autremont. The prisoner gives the name of Kit Cody, and says he is from "everywhere." He was arrested on charges of beating his way and is being held for further investigation. Sheriff Roberts says Cody resembles Roy D'Autremont, with the exception of being slightly taller than the latter.

Siskiyou Ranch Home Burned by Big Brush Fire

SAN FRANCISCO, June 9.—(AP)—A forest brush and grass fire on the Oregon-California line north of Hornbrook, Calif., which has been raging for two days, had burned over an area 4 miles long and 2 miles wide yesterday. It was reported to the United States forest service headquarters here. A ranch house was burned Monday night and other ranches in the path of the flames. The fire was started by a miner burning brush around his cabin, the forest service reported. He was arrested.

democratic opponent in the 1924 election.

Senator Fess, republican, of Ohio, told the senate he could not speak of the outcome of the primary "without a pang." Senator Fess was one of those who brought into the open the whisperings of disagreement between the Vice President which have engaged the agent of little groups about the capitol ever since Senator Watson, republican of Indiana, read an outline of General Dawes' views in favor of the equalization fee principle. Senator Fess, who represents the vice president's native state in the senate, dubbed the equalization fee proposal before the senate the "Dawes-McNary-Haugen plan" and asserted

that its enactment would "ruin the country."

Criticizes Coolidge
Senator Harrison, democrat, of Mississippi, also took a shot at the Coolidge-Dawes talk in a characteristic fling at republican candidates for re-election and the administration generally, with the Iowa primary as his text.

Turning on Senator Watson, who was interrupting his analysis of the record defeats suffered by administration supporters in Iowa, Illinois, Pennsylvania and Oregon, he said the Indiana senator had "been able to squeeze through" the recent republican primary in that state, but not "by clinging to Cal and standing by Andy."

"The only reason" the others—Cummins, McKinley, Pepper and Stanfield, were defeated, Senator Harrison held, "was that they clung to Cal and stood by Andy too long." He said he didn't know which one is to be the others candidate for the presidency and "it may be that they will swap around and the one who can't be president will be vice president."

Sheets Prove Lifesaver For Man In Blaze

PORTLAND, Ore., June 9.—(AP)—Ralph Adams escaped from a fire which burned his home early today by hastily making a rope of sheets and sliding down from his bedroom window. The fire started in the basement, supposedly from spontaneous combustion of paint.

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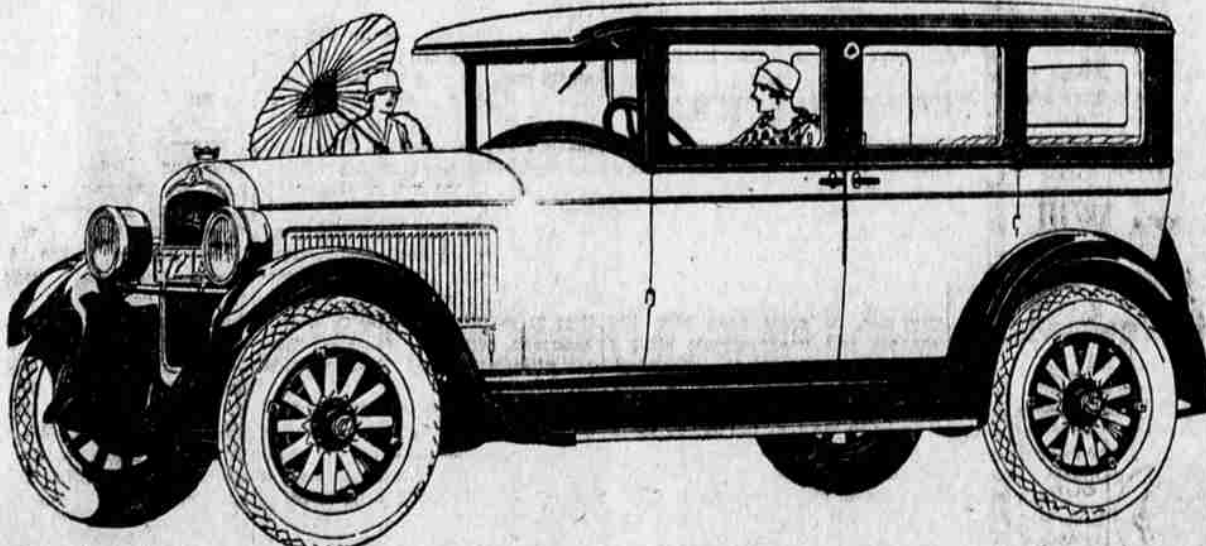
