Duffy's Bail Is Raised To One Thousand

Attorney Ashurst Cut Short in Argument Today

Instead of cutting the cash bail of James Duffy of Pelican City, accused of deadly assault on M. A. Mann of the Hot Springs bath house on Decoration day, Judge R. A. Emmitt made personal investigation of Mann's condition last night and today he raised Duffy's bail from \$250 to \$1,000.

Attorney E. B. Ashurst appearing for Duffy, who is confined in the county jail, set forth the argument in the justice court this morning that Mann was not seriously hurt and that he could bring in many affidavits that the bath house owner was about the streets attending to his regular business.

"Don't bother with your affidavits," counseled Judge Emmitt. "I made a trip over to see Mann last night and found him in a serious condition and in care of a nurse at the hospital both day and night."

"The only change in the bail that I will make at this time, since you are arguing that Duffy be released on a \$100 cash bail, is to raise the \$250 to \$1,000."

H. Poole Lays Plans for Show House in K. F.

Harry Poole, owner of the Pine Tree and Liberty theatres returned from San Francisco and Los Angeles Tuesday night, where he made an extensive investigation of the most modern play houses in the leading California cities, in the quest of ideas to be incorporated in his proposed new show house here which is to be built on the block east of the Hart building, and which may face on 8th street.

Plans are now in the hands of San Francisco architects and will be forwarded here and placed on exhibition in a few days, Mr. Poole stated.

At Los Angeles on June 2 to 5, Mr. Poole was in attendance at the national convention of the Motion Picture Theatre Owners of America. The meetings were extremely interesting and valuable to a moving picture house operator, Mr. Poole reports.

A deal was closed at Hollywood for a showing here early this fall of two great pictures from the Fairbank's Studios, which are not yet released but were given a pre-release showing at Grauman's Egyptian theatre at Hollywood.

The pictures are Douglas Fairbanks' newest film "The Black Pirate" and Mary Pickford's latest and greatest "Sparrows."

This would allow the non-observance of the long and short haul provisions of the interstate commerce act.

YREKA, Cal., June 10.—(Special to The Herald)—Peter B. Kyne, famous as the author of Cappy Ricks and The Valley of the Giants, will arrive in Siskiyou county next Thursday to remain for six weeks while he is writing on a new serial story. He will make his headquarters at the Duke ranch near Gazelle.

Harry Leon Wilson, author of Ruggles of Red Gap and other famous stories, is now at the Duke ranch turning out some fiction, and Samuel Rhythe, another famous writer, left there last Friday for his home in Carmel, Calif.

Kyne has done much of his writing in Siskiyou county. The understanding Heart, now running in a

popular magazine as a serial, was written by Kyne at the Duke ranch last summer. The story has its setting in Siskiyou county.

Kyne declares that he writes his best fiction while acting the part of rancher. He arises at 6 a. m., breakfasts at 6:30 and from that time until 9:30 he works hard on books. Promptly at that hour he covers his typewriter, dons his hat and coat and goes for a horseback ride, motor trip or fishing. He says three hours a day is enough for any writer but declares that anyone aspiring to fame in the world of fiction, must put in 21 hours a week spread over the entire seven days.

At the PINE TREE

Grim humor—the kind that actually laughed at death—was the brand most common among the railroad builders in the sixties when the first ties were put down to unite the east and west.
