A baby and pre-school clinic was held at Modoc Point Wednesday. Physical examinations were conducted by Dr. Alice Flood from the Child Health Association, New York, assisted by Dr. G. S. Newsom, Klamath county health officer. Dr. Flood is conducting these clinics in various counties in Oregon during the month of June. She is accompanied by Mrs. Glendora M. Blakeley, state advisory nurse.

Miss Grace Snelling, county nurse of Lake county, came to Klamath with Dr. Flood and Mrs. Blakeley on Tuesday and returned to Lakeview this morning.

Fostered by P. T. A. The clinic at Lamm's mill was fostered by the Parent Teacher's Association and was held at the school house there.

Sixteen children were examined and mothers were advised as to the care of their children with particular emphasis to the problem of proper diet.

Those assisting Dr. Flood and Dr. Newsom were Mrs. Blakeley, Mrs. William Roger, nurse from the Indian reservation, Miss Hazel B. McClelland, and Miss Lydia L. Fricke of the Klamath county health unit.
