CONVICT TRIES TO SUICIDE IN OREGON PRISON

Man Implicated in Claremont Tavern Murder Is in Serious Condition

SALEM, Ore., June 16. (AP)—With suicidal intent, prison officials believe, Dave Smith, who is serving life at the state penitentiary for participation in the Claremont Tavern robbery and murder in Portland six years ago, took poison last night. His condition was noticed by a guard and Dr. R. L. Edwards, prison physician, was hastily summoned. Smith was unconscious when the physician arrived, and quick use of a stomach pump and antidotes saved his life.

Today Smith's condition is said to be satisfactory, but the actual result of the poison will not be known for several days.

After regaining consciousness Smith claimed that he took the poison by accident. The fact that he took an overdose is believed to have prevented the drug from operating fast enough to cause death.

It was the Claremont robbery in which J. N. Burgess and George Peringer of Pendleton were killed, which led to Smith's imprisonment. Implicated with Smith were James Ogle and Walter Banister. Many months after they were received at the state prison, which was during the period when capital punishment was abolished in Oregon, Ogle signed a confession that he fired the shots that killed the two men. Ogle was later killed at the prison by guard John Davidson. Banister now has charge of the prison pump house and has never given any trouble at the prison.

GENERAL STRIKE IS OPPOSED BY HEAD OF LABOR

William Green Says Ultimate End in View Is Lost Sight of in Fight

DENVER, June 16. (AP)—General strikes which would involve the violation of wage agreements were condemned yesterday by William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor in an address before the convention of the Rotary International.

A general strike, he said, means that the line of industrial conflict is immediately changed so that it seems to become a contest between employees and government rather than between employees and employers. He contended that the real issues of the strike are lost sight of in the maelstrom of public opinion and public inconveniences. The original grievance which caused the general strike, no matter how meritorious, must remain unsettled until after the general strike had ended. This, he declared, works untold hardship and makes more difficult the bringing about of a sound adjustment of the real grievance.

No General Strike

"Fate has ordained that I should speak for the millions of men and women directly associated with the American Federation of Labor," he said, "so far as I can influence the policies of this great organization no general strike will be contemplated with which such strike would involve the propagation of wage agreements."

President Green enumerated some of the outstanding achievements of organized labor in the United States, including the shorter work day, increase in wages, abolishment of the sweat shop and tenement house slavery, legislation for the health, comfort and safety of wage earners and compensation laws. He told of the "ceaseless fight" to bring about adoption of the proposed amendment to the constitution to forbid child labor.

"We hope to bring to the workers a wage which will not only permit them to live in their own homes in accordance with the American standard of living but will also permit them to enjoy the higher advantages of spiritual and cultural development," he said.

Abolish Child Labor

"We are striving to abolish the iniquities of child labor and we are endeavoring to bring about a spirit of co-operation and right relation-

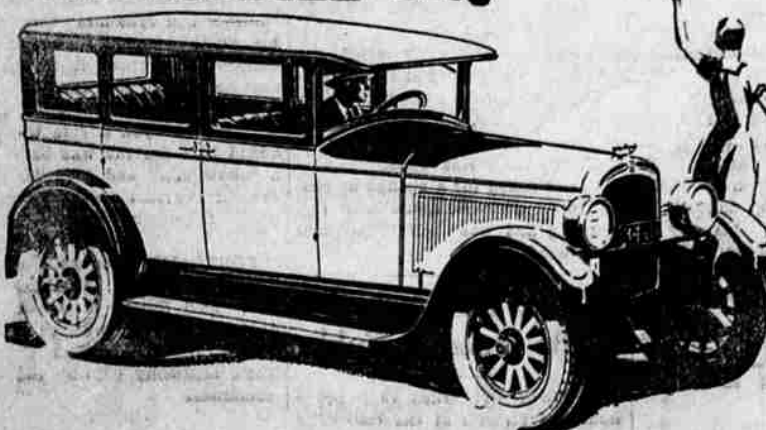

If he failed to make the turn, the property reverted to the original owner, who then gave another binder at an advanced price, and the merry game of binders was once more set in motion.

This resulted in an inflation that

all but killed the real estate business in the state and the substantial people quickly saw that something must be done to stop it. Plans were devised to bring an end to this sort of transactions, and immediately the boom flattened out and normalcy was resumed. It is Miss Conboy's belief that this winter will see a good, substantial advance made in all sections of the state, but those who are looking for a return of the frenzied financing that brought such unsavory fame to the state will be disappointed.
