

Head Hunters Are Active In Remote Jungle

Not Interested in Whites;
Fine Healthy
Tribe

PARA, Brazil, June 17.—(AP)—Dr. Bert S. Dickey, well known scientist, and his wife of a few months, the former Elizabeth Parker, have just finished an exploration trip that carried them through the land of the head hunters and the most remote parts of South America.

They obtained a full motion picture record of the process of reducing and curing human heads as practiced by the Jiveros of eastern Ecuador. The Indians had just returned from one of their head hunting expeditions, which was found to be in retaliation for the kidnapping of their women by another tribe.

Head Is Treated

The skin of the victim is cut about the chest and shoulders and then pulled over the head, removing the face and scalp intact. It is treated for ten days with tan bark and hot sand, becoming hard and black. The cured head measures about six inches in diameter. The features are well preserved and the lips sewn to prevent the escape of evil spirits. The head-hunters are not interested in the heads of white men.

Healthy Tribe

Dr. Dickey found the head hunters a healthy, fine type. Other tribes were found in a dying condition due to hook worm in the mountains and tuberculosis in the lowlands.

The members of the party lived in tents with mosquito net windows. They ate bananas and children and occasionally a deer or wild pig. They astonished the Indians with their portable bath tub which was carried because of the alligators and the man-biting fish which infest the rivers. No money was used in paying the Indians for their services, cotton cloth, gun powder, buckshot, needles and matches serving as a kind of currency.

CITY AIDS AN OLD COUPLE TO GET MARRIED IN N. J.

Attempt to Prove Silver-Haired Bridegroom Insane Ends With Failure

PAULSBORO, N. J., June 17.—(AP)—Dr. William H. Pounds, 74, a former mayor of Paulsboro, and his bride, 52, have been receiving congratulations from townspeople after he had blocked efforts to prevent his marriage by having him committed to the state hospital for the insane.

Dr. Pounds and Miss Jennie Stiles were married shortly before midnight, and two score indignant citizens had driven to the hospital in Trenton in motor cars and convicted authorities that Dr. Pounds was of sound mind. The aged man was torn from the side of his intended bride yesterday morning by two unidentified men who displayed papers calling for his commitment to the institution. Dr. Pounds asserted that his son, Charles, who lives in Newtown Square, Pa., was responsible for his treatment.

The action aroused the populace of Paulsboro. Nearly 50 citizens went to Trenton to obtain Dr. Pounds release and when they returned with him the entire town turned out. Factory whistles blew and church bells sounded a welcome that brought men, women and children to the streets.

Crew Saved from Grounded Vessel

TOKYO, June 17.—(AP)—All members of the crew of the British freighter City of Naples were rescued early today by the Japanese cruiser Kasuga and destroyer Urukaze, the Kasuga reported by wireless to the navy department this morning. Seventy-three men were taken off the freighter, which went aground Tuesday about 150 miles south of Tokyo.

The rescues were accomplished only after several hours hazardous work, which followed the arrival of the Kasuga from Yokosuka last night. The City of Naples crew are being taken to Yokohama aboard the cruiser. The freighter carried a mixed crew of British and Lascars.
