port Gaines in Seattle, and her step-mother, who was visiting in California and who today was hurrying here.

The girl left her father's home about 8 o'clock Wednesday evening to walk. Only two persons have reported seeing her from that time until she was found dead yesterday.

**Scream Is Heard**

F. S. Stokes and his wife Wednesday evening were passing a bunch of shrubbery near Green Lake, on whose edge the body was found, and observed a rough looking man standing several feet from the path on which they were walking. When they had gone several feet they met a girl answering the description of Miss Gaines. Several minutes Mrs. Stokes heard a woman's scream, but her husband suggested it was from children playing and let the matter pass. Their description of the man is detailed.

According to a reconstruction of the crime by detectives the man seized Miss Gaines without warning. She screamed. He choked her and then dragged her. Her slippers and hat fell off. She broke away and waded through the shallow edge of the lake for yards while her attacker pursued. As they emerged from the water, he again strangled the girl and killed her by five blows on the head with a stone.
