

EXPERTS FAVOR DEVELOPMENT OF POWER OF RIVER

Favorable Report Issued on Coquille Project by Interior Department

WASHINGTON, June 21. —(AP)—Interior department engineers have found that development of 36,000 continuous horsepower of natural storage reservoirs on Coquille river in Oregon is possible.

With six billion board feet of timber within seven miles of the larger reservoir sites, the department stated eventually the sites may be developed for power in the timber industry.

The entire Coquille river basin was studied. The engineers reported that the power reservoir of the basin probably will not be utilized until hydro-electric energy can compete with electric energy generated by steam produced from coal reserves, or until the demand exceeds the supply of water in the basin.
