

PELICANS TROUNCE CAVE MEN IN FAST GAME

Klamath Falls Is Now Tied With Medford For Leadership of League

Klamath fans were treated to a free hitting game of "a-la-Coast" league baseball at the fair grounds yesterday afternoon when Rip King's Pelicans trounced the Grants Pass Cavemen by the score of 8 to 4. Ashland defeated Medford 5 to 3, placing Klamath and Medford in a tie for first place.

The ball game looked tough in the first inning when Chaney and J. Blevins, second and third men up for Grants Pass, each hit safe. Then Drolette, stellar first sacker, smashed a beautiful clot over the center field garden wall, scoring three runs.

After the nine hundred fans who ventured out to the game had recovered from their heart failure, at this point, Russel Sage the elongated Pelican heaver, steadied down and mowed down the Cavemen in fine style, netting eleven strike outs from the second to the ninth canto.

Sage Gets Real Support

The Pelican club gave Sage class A support all through the game, with King's flashy infield handling everything that came their way. Duback and Fuller, the scintillating second base combination, blocked everything in their territory. Fuller stopped one clout from Blevins' bat in the seventh inning that was good for a hit in any league by diving full length for the ball then crawling to second where he cut off Chaney who came thundering down from first which he had gained via the base-on-balls route. Frenchie Baynes made a pretty try for a clean hit over third base in the fifth inning and otherwise conducted himself in big time style.

No Wrangling

One of the main features of the game was the absence of wrangling which was the outcome of a recent league decision against this bush league tendency. The fans predicted at yesterday's game that the new system will have the effect of doubling gate receipts here in the future. Grants Pass scored their fourth and final count in the third inning when Chaney walked and scored on a two bagger by J. Blevins. At this point the old ball game stood a potential failure for the locals by a 4 to 0 count.

Klamath Opens Up

In the fourth inning the Pelicans began to take kindly to Hub Pernoll, ex-Detroit crooked arm moundman who did the honors for the visitors for the full nine frames yesterday. Doc Noel led off with a clean hit and scored on Atken's two bagger. Then with Duback and Montgomery down via the fly ball route, Fuller hit safe and stole second. Mathews took first on an error and both scored on a mighty swing by Captain Rip King. That tied the score 4 to 4.

In the fifth inning Noel hit safe again and scored on Duback's second hit during the afternoon's festivities.

"Matty" Hits Homer

In the sixth inning Fuller led off with a two ply swat and scored on Matty Mathews' home run over the right field fence.

In the eighth inning Sage walked with two down, took second on an overthrow by Catcher Smith of Grants Pass then scored on a hit by Baynes.

In the ninth frame the visitors made a desperate attempt to tie up the ball game. Smith hit safe and took third on Montgomery's miscue of Chaney's high fly to right field. Smith was cut off at home by a pretty throw from Fuller to King. On a fielder's choice from Drolette's bat, J. Blevins was cut off at second by Duback making a pretty stop and throw to Fuller.

While Klamath was fanning the Cavemen into the cellar position of the league standing here yesterday, Ashland downed the Medford port pickers on their home lot by the score of 5 to 3. By this defeat of the Medford league leaders, Klamath moved into a tie for first place.

Big Turnout Expected

This situation, according to Klamath league directors will call for a mighty turnout of Klamath fans at Medford next Sunday when the Pelicans will make a desperate effort to avenge the defeat suffered by the ideal club here a week ago.

The umpiring job yesterday was handled in first class style by Powell and Watters. What hearing was done yesterday was confined to the more rabid fans, and these birds felt this was their privilege and right purchased at the box office.

Baseball stock here is now well over par.

Gloom enshrouded Klamath fight fans with the announcement this morning by Johnny Sylvester, fight manager and promoter, that the boxing card scheduled to come off tomorrow night at Scandia hall was called off because of injuries to "Kid" Starkey, Chico lightweight, and Wilbur Harrington, Indian lightweight.

The all-star card has been officially postponed by the boxing commission until June 29.

Facts of the postponement are short and simple. Starkey several days ago ran a nail into his foot while working as a carpenter. The wound was not severe until Saturday when infection set in.

Because of the infection, Starkey's physician refused to allow him to appear against Benny Dotson in the main event of the boxing card tomorrow night.

Harrington's trouble is a bad thumb. He refuses to fight until it is healed.

Sylvester went to the boxing commission this morning with his troubles and that body officially postponed the fight card until June 29.

"In the second place, we have had enough water pressure to sprinkle our fairways in good shape through our water system."

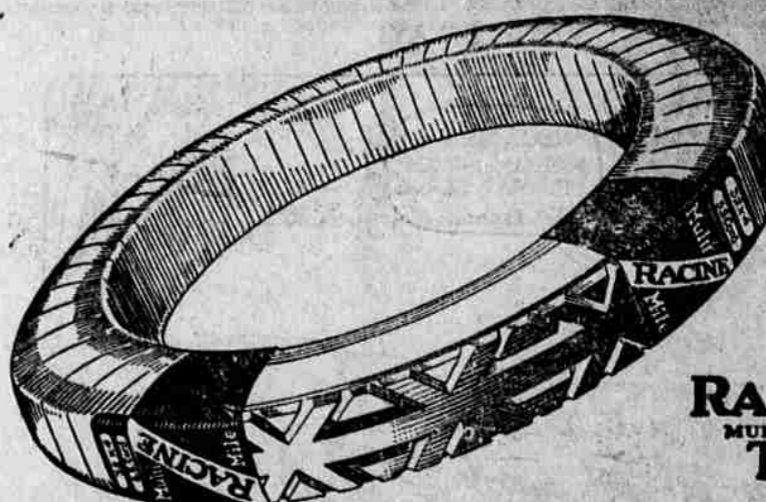
"The greens, however, are in good shape. We expect to concentrate on three or four holes the rest of this summer in order to get that many in shape for play this fall."
