

### Talbot Named Director On County Board

### Underwood And Rogers Elected on City Board

Incomplete returns from the county school election held yesterday indicate the election of H. A. Talbot of Plevas on the county board in the place of Roy Nelson of Keno.

C. H. Underwood received 105 votes and Leslie Rogers 109 in the election of city school directors held here yesterday. C. C. Colvin, manager of the Union Oil company branch was recently appointed to fill the vacancy left on this board by the resignation of Oscar Shive.

At Bonanza J. O. Hamaker, J. L. Bold and R. R. Lytle were elected directors for the Bonanza district. Also at Bonanza a project for the building of a \$5,000 gymnasium on the school grounds, carried by a vote of 28 to 15.

DIAMOND LAKE, June 22.—(Special to The Herald)—A hiking trip through virgin timber that is seldom viewed by man was the remarkable experience of Herbert Landis and Harold Crank of Roseburg who have just arrived at Diamond lake. The young men hiked over the North Umpqua river trail. Several side trips to Lamela, Taketee and Watson Falls were made. Bedding, food and other necessities were packed over 100 miles by the men. Many deer were seen.

### Alleged Fakirs Will Be Given Trial Tomorrow

The case of the state of Oregon vs. William Hough and V. O. White, accused of stealing \$15 in cash from August Krueger in Klamath county on March 10, 1926, will come up for trial in the circuit court here tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.

The two defendants in this case are accused of representing themselves to be solicitors for an organization devoted to improving working conditions for highway laborers. They are alleged to have accepted Krueger on the Dallas-California highway near Barclay Springs on March 10. Upon alleged receipt of a \$20 bill from Krueger for dues in the fictitious organization, Hough and White are accused of stepping on the gas and disappearing in their car in the direction of Bend. The two men were arrested a few days later by Bend officers from telegraphic advice of the local sheriff's office.

**CLOSED TO SMOKING**

ure when it comes up for decision of the voters June 29."

A communication was read last night from the Klamath county chamber of commerce, requesting the mayor to appoint one councilman to head a commission of civic club representatives and a member of the labor council to study out and recommend an improved system of parking automobiles and traffic regulations for the city of Klamath Falls. It was generally conceded by the councilmen that the present system was out of date and ineffectual and should be changed. Mayor Goddard appointed Elmer

Balsiger, head of the street committee to work with the new commission and to set a time for the first meeting and organization of the new commission. The civic clubs and labor council will be asked to appoint one member each to act with Mr. Balsiger on the new commission.

**Demand Fencing**  
E. L. Elliott, district attorney, and Arlie Worrell appeared before the council and asked that immediate action be taken to force the fencing of the reclamation service canal in the vicinity of Eleventh street, where the accident which resulted in the death of C. T. Hoynton occurred on Sunday. The matter was referred to the street committee.

A petition asking that East Main street be oiled in order to preserve that thoroughfare and to keep down the dust was read to the council and the street committee was instructed

to call on C. C. Sealey, resident engineer of the state highway department to ascertain if some oiling plan could be worked out.

A petition was read from the California Oregon Power Company in which permission was requested to construct a six-inch water main under the sidewalk on the proposed Sixth street viaduct instead of through the railroad yards at this point. The matter was tabled for further consideration.

SAN FRANCISCO.—(AP)—A water company may charge \$1.25 per family with 25c per month extra for each cow, but the same method may not be used for each additional child, the state railroad commission told Paul Hunter, owner of a water company at Fortuna, Humboldt county, when he sought to increase water rates on that basis.

### Can't Use Petitions Signed Back in 1924

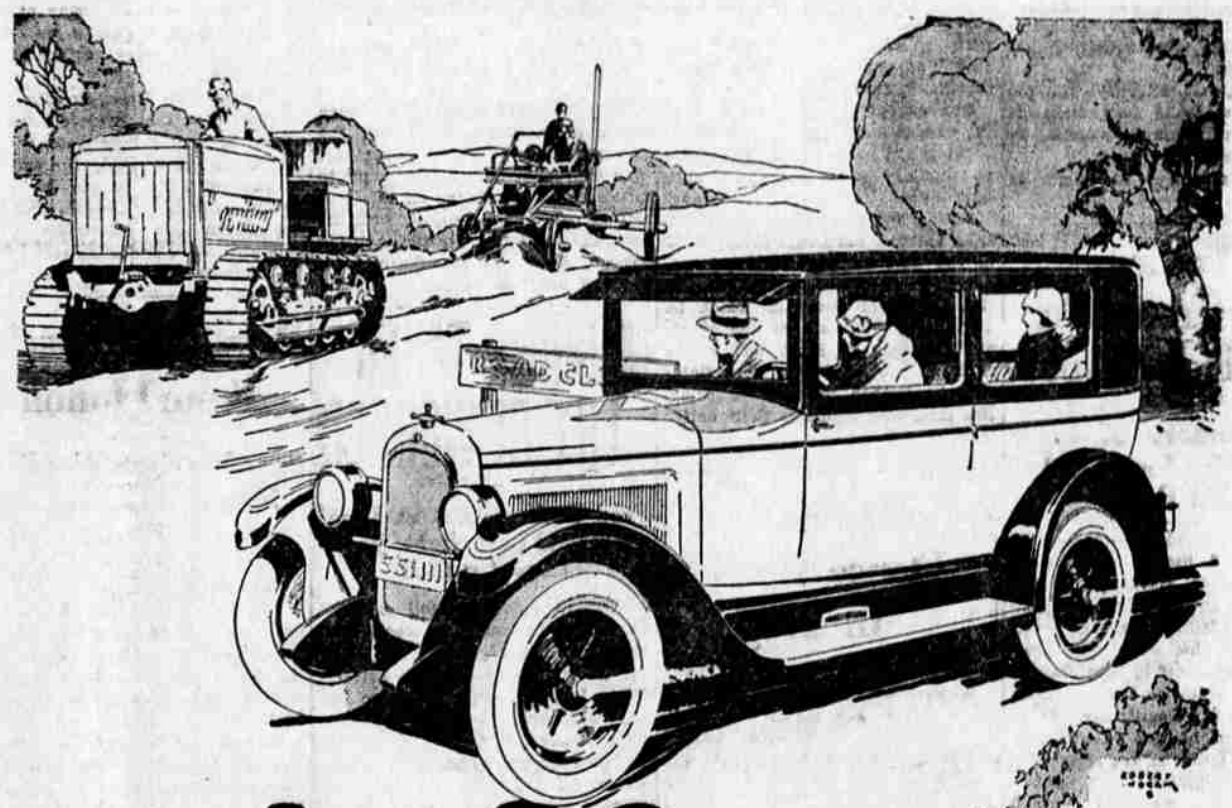
