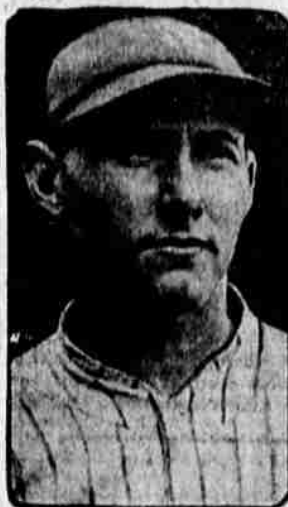


Joins Yanks

Fast Southpaw Will Twirl For Klamath Falls; Looks Good

A new pitcher, a southpaw carrying the moniker of "Lefty" Sylva, will grace the mound of the Klamath Falls baseball nine, it was announced this morning by Austin Hayden, director of the Klamath nine.

Sylva, who is from Oakland and who has been pitching for Grants Pass since the first of the season, will arrive in Klamath Falls tomorrow night. Under league rules, he can not pitch until a week from Sunday.

"He looks good to us," Hayden said this morning. "We have had our eyes on him for some time and he can sure twirl a superior brand of ball. We hope that he will turn out good for Klamath."

Acquisition of Sylva will strengthen and round out the team. Sage and Street, both port sides, have been bearing the brunt of the pitching. Klamath lacked a good left-hander to sandwich in between right-handers in a tough moment of a game.

SUZANNE BEATS MARY K. BROWN

French Marvel Invincible at Wimbledon Tourney; Two Straight Sets

WIMBLEDON, Eng., June 22.—(AP)—Suzanne Lenglen eliminated Miss Mary K. Brown, champion of the American Wightman Cup team from the women's singles, by a score of 6-2, 6-3, in the Wimbledon tournament today. Miss Brown succeeded in taking more games from the French star than in their final match in the international hard court championships in Paris recently.

Miss Lenglen and Miss Brown received an ovation when they appeared on the court arm in arm. The French star carried three racquets and a heavy coat sweater. She won the racquet toss for service.

Miss Lenglen won the first set at 6-2. Miss Lenglen lost the first points but won the game, Miss Brown's service was ineffective. The French girl took the second and third games with frequent placements. Miss Brown's service improved but Suzanne took the fourth and then won her own service. Both played very ordinary tennis.

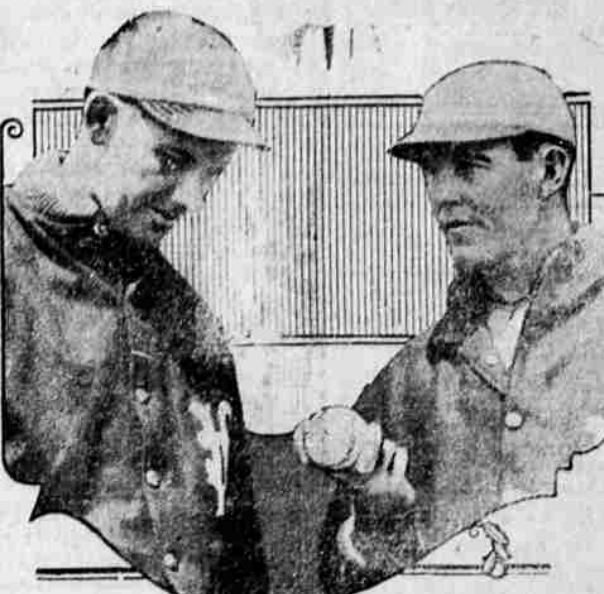
KEEP THE WORMS AT HOME

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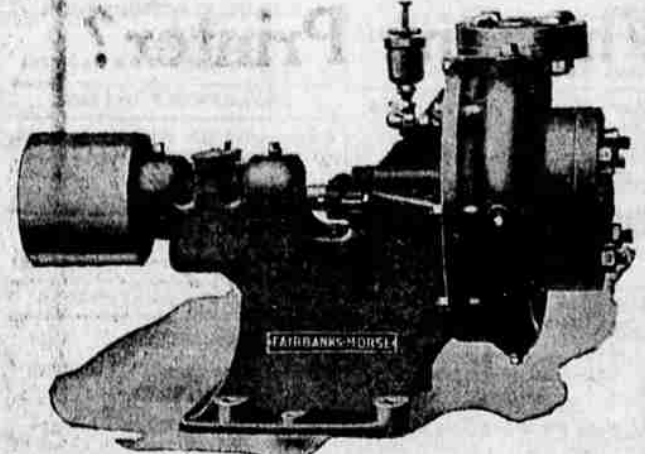
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
