The apartments will include 16 apartments and 39 rooms. Material will be of brick.

Already garages for the new structure have been erected and ground will be broken for the main building in the near future.

Construction of a frame and stucco duplex apartment to cost \$4500 and to be located on Ninth street will be started immediately by Louis Neill.

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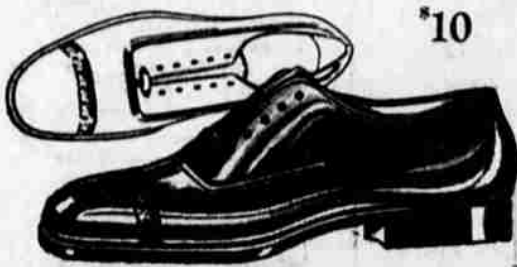
