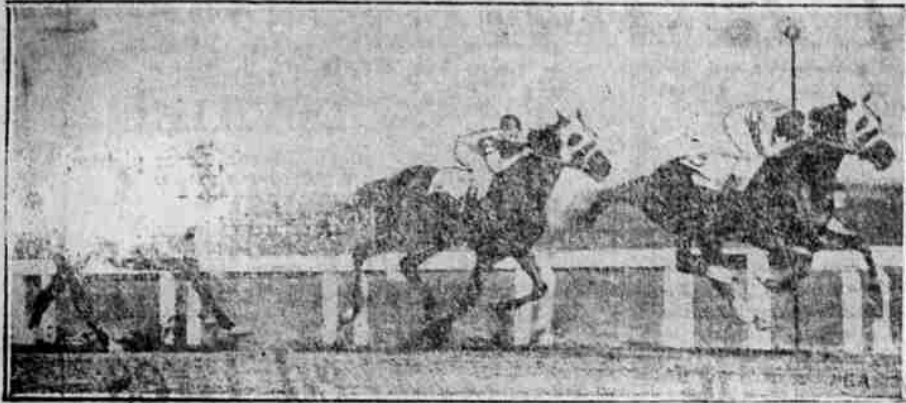


"ONE-TWO"—THAT MEANS BRADLEY!

PELICANS ARE HITTING BALL HARD STEADILY

Flashy Infield Hits Over 300; Batting Averages Are Fattened

Klamath's all-right and hard hitting infield continues to sock the ball at 300 or over. It was revealed today with announcement of official batting averages for the first six games.

"Frenchy" Bayness, the Pelican's fiery little third sacker, is leading the team with .375. Aiken, first baseman, and Duback, second sacker, are second and third, with .363 and .348 respectively. Fuller, short stop, is fifth with .304. Other 300 and over hitters include Montgomery and Clark, outfielders.

In general, batting averages, particularly those of the infield, were fattened as a result of the game with Grants Pass here last Sunday.

AGGIE TRACKMAN JOGS 1050 MILES WHILE IN TRAINING FOR RACES

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, June 22.—How many miles does a trackman cover in training while at college? If the athlete ran in one direction where would he land?

Theodore Butts, Oregon Aggie distance man and basketball star, who is a conscientious trainer, has covered 1050 miles on the track since he came to O. A. C. In preparation for cross-country runs Butts ran an average of three miles a night, five nights a week for ten weeks, which netted him 150 miles. To this figure he added 20 weeks of track

practice—an item of 200 miles—which brought his yearly travelling to 350 miles and three years of this grind make 1050 miles.

It is estimated that if Butts used his track mileage alone he could have jogged east past Pocatella, Ida., or taken in the winter in San Luis Obispo, Calif., or the summer months in Alaska. If he counted on his entire mileage in all athletic activities since coming to college he could take in the Sesqui-Centennial International Exposition at Philadelphia with a side trip to New York or Boston.
