"Gerry" Back From Trip With Sore Back And Bad Temper

"The rottenest road in the world is located between Hildebrand and the town of Sprague River," is the opinion of Garry Cozad, Klamath Falls constable, who made the run by auto to the Campbell-Towle city yesterday.

"I believe Klamath Falls is losing considerable Sprague River valley trade on account of this bad road," Cozad said. "Klamath authorities

should take some action in the matter as all that would be required to make a very passable road would be to put two good men out on that stretch with picks and shovels for three or four days."

WHEELER UNDER FIRE IN PROBE AT WASHINGTON

Senator Reed Tears Into Anti-Saloon League Head In Campaign Probe

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 24.—(AP)—Taking the witness stand after a private consultation with committee members Wayne H. Wheeler resumed his story of anti-saloon league activities today at an open session of the senate campaign funds committee.

He again was questioned in detail about league finances and league policies, and in order to be in a position to reply he took with him to the stand a mass of information brought to Washington at the committee's request from the league headquarters at Westerville, Ohio.

Wheeler Under Fire
Chairman Reed began without preliminaries a series of questions on the basis of the year book of the dry league for 1925. Wheeler sat back from the table with his chair on the bias. He chewed the end of a yellow pencil.

"Is this the year book of the Anti-Saloon league?" Reed asked, as he passed the book over.

"Yes, it is prepared by Dr. Ernest H. Cherrington. There may be some errors in it."

"Is it the official publication?"

"Yes."

A series of prohibition articles prepared for the New York Times in March, then came under scrutiny.

Denies Writing Article

"I did not write them," Wheeler said.

"I furnished the data for them, but did not see the finished copy."

"You made no corrections of them afterwards?"

"No, not in the press."

"If there is anything in those articles you want to repudiate, point it out. Take your time to do so."

"I don't think of anything now. It would take a long time to read them."

Widely Syndicated

"They were widely syndicated, were they not?"

The articles purported to tell the inside story of prohibition adoption.

"Did you say the drys have invested \$35,000,000 in prohibition," asked Reed.

"I don't recall that exact statement. I probably said it this way: That they put it in the educational campaign during the thirty years, and that is approximately correct."

BORD GETS BEST PRICE FOR WOOL

The highest price that has been paid for Klamath county wool this year was received by Rex Bord Tuesday, when he disposed of a carload of his clip to John Slemmons, local representative for Eismann Brothers of Boston. The price paid was 31 cents. This is within three-quarters of a cent a pound of the highest price paid at the Shanks sale last week, and which was the high-

est price paid for Oregon wool. "While this is a pretty good price," said Mr. Bord today, "it is less than wool is worth. The present condition of the market should demand a higher price, but the buyers are taking advantage of the existing conditions among sheepmen, who are unable to carry their clips much longer on account of the need of money in their business. I believe, however, that the price of wool will gradually increase until it reaches a point where those who hold their clips will get a price that will yield them a fair return on their investment. Klamath county wool is among the best in the country."

man's behalf with the result that he was taken to Portland for examination before the state veteran's organization under parole to Dr. G. S. Newsom. Doctors connected with the veterans bureau upon examination pronounced Howard as insane and he was immediately sent to the U. S. Veterans' hospital at Boise, Idaho.

Mental Breakdown

Dr. G. S. Newsom, Klamath county health officer, who was present in the court room was called upon by the court to report his findings in the Howard case. Dr. Newsom explained that Howard was suffering a mental and nervous breakdown at the time of his bad check activity here and that in his opinion the dismissing of the indictments would afford the man such mental relief that his recovery might be hastened rather than retarded. The United States has now classed Howard as a ward. Dr. Newsom said, and he is under a \$83 per month disability status at this time.
