Fight Card To Be Held
Next Tuesday Evening;
Starkey, Dotson, Ready

Kid Starkey's infected foot is healing rapidly. Harrington's hand will be mended and everything gives promise of one of the fastest fight cards next Tuesday night at the Scandia hall that has ever been staged in Klamath Falls.

This same card was postponed last week because of injuries to Starkey, who fights in the main event, and Harrington, who scraps in the semi-windup. Johnny Sylvester, who is handling the match, went to the boxing commission with his troubles, and that body agreed to allow Johnny to postpone the card until next Tuesday.

Doctor's Statement

The card, as a whole, looks just as good, if not better, than it did two weeks ago. Starkey, despite his injured foot, is in great shape. All he needs is two good sweating workouts. Dotson, of course, is on edge, and has been for the past five days. The two boys will fight at around 135 pounds.

Harrington is Question

Harrington is the big question, but in event he still contends his hand is in bad shape. Jack Crim, who can beat and has beaten Harrington, will take on the tough Billy Harms.

Although Crim is a sweeter boxer, the fans favor Harrington because of the Indian's reckless abandon and willingness to take a hard sock to give a harder one.

Crim, it is generally conceded, is one of the best boxers in Klamath. He is fast, heady and hits like a whip lash. But the fans do not like good boxers. They like good fighters who like to take 'em and give 'em, and Jack Crim to date has not displayed a disposition to mix it toe to toe.

But the Crim-Harms go will be good if staged, with the betting mostly on Crim.

"Buddy" Crim, Jack's brother, is going to try his best to flatten the clever fighter, "Sailor" Fay. "Buddy" was born with a punch and like other things it has improved with age.

THYE FLATTENED
BY IRA DERN IN
PORTLAND MATCH

Salt Lake Grappler Wins Two Out of Three Falls in Spectacular Bout

PORTLAND, Ore., June 24. — (AP) — Ira Dern, Salt Lake grappler, took two falls from Ted Thye of Portland in one of the most spectacular bouts of the season. Thye was a victim of Dern's headlock in the first fall which Dern took in 31 minutes, 51 seconds. Thye succeeded in gaining the second fall with a crotch hold in 18 minutes, 50 seconds. It was another crotch hold in the third session that gave Dern his chance to pin Thye.

For the first time, ringside weighing in was witnessed by the fans. Thye weighed 174½ and Dern 182. Boiling over the light heavy weight limit, Dern could not claim the championship through his victory.

In the preliminary, Jimmie Anderson and Bob Myers wrestled 30 minutes to a draw.

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INVITE KLAMATH TO COMPETE IN BIG TOURNAMENT

Burns Wants Representation From Klamath Falls on July Fourth

Klamath was officially invited this morning to participate in an "East of the Cascades" golf tournament to be staged in Burns, Ore., 200 miles north of Klamath Falls, on July 4.

"We feel," said W. A. Rounsaville, Burns, who extended the invitation, "that any east-of-the-Cascades tournament would not be complete without three or four Klamath golfers."

"We're not allowing entries from any other east of the Cascades. You see, they have a head start on us over there, while we on the east side of the range are just beginners."

When Rounsaville was advised of the fact that while Klamath was laying out a golf course, that nevertheless there was no place for local enthusiasts to play short of Medford, he smiled.

"That won't make much difference," he said. "We have only had our course for about a year, and we are not very good. Our idea was to stage the tournament in order to arouse more interest in the sport east of the Cascades. Our best players learned to play elsewhere, and I understand you have some players here who are good for the same reason."
