Flood Inundates German Farm Land

BERLIN, June 26.—(A)—Twenty thousand troops, one fifth of Germany's entire regular army, were under relief service orders today to repair the damage done by the worst floods in Germany in a century.

Saxony was the heaviest sufferer with 18 million dollars damage to crops and property out of thirty million dollars damage throughout Germany. Fifteen dead have been counted.

Approximately 100,000 acres of cultivated land were under water and some villages near Halle were entirely surrounded and depended upon food dropped from air planes for subsistence.
