CHILDREN HURT
IN CAR CRASH

the car go over. I backed up immediately to the scene of the accident and then for the first time discovered that all four children had been in the car. When they passed us they must have been down groveling in the bottom of the tonneau, as none of us saw a child in the racing machine when it passed.

Under Car Wheel
"Perkins was pinned under the left rear wheel of the car, which was smashed, and we did not attempt to get him out until enough of a crowd had gathered to lift the car. Our first efforts were to gather up the children, who were covered with dirt and blood and whimpering with pain and fright. We loaded all of them into my car, with their father, and drove immediately to the hospital.

"At the hospital I assisted the doctor at the operating table while little Eugene's wounds were being dressed. The little fellow was out of his head but kept trying to say something. I placed my ear down by his mouth and heard him mutter several times, 'Papa, don't drive so fast.'"

The Klamath county district attorney's office will investigate the affair, according to E. L. Elliott, Klamath prosecutor.

At the sheriff's office this morning it was said that no official record of the accident was available.

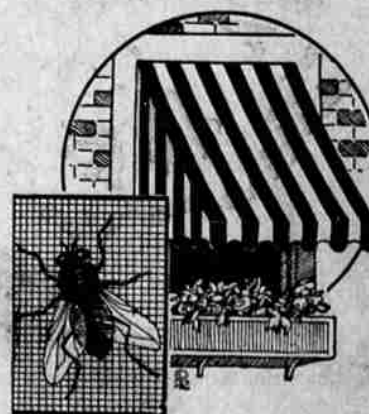
