

Shades Of Night End Weird Ball Exhibition With Local Nine Losers; Score 14 To 15

In a beautiful exhibition of dumb baseball at the Jackson county fair grounds yesterday afternoon the Medford Pearpickers out endured the Klamath club by the estimated count of 15 to 14.

The estimated hits were Klamath 16 and Medford 11. The estimated errors were Klamath 10, Medford 4.

Medford used four pitchers during the sweltering melodrama. Levoff, their ace twirler, was rapped to the showers in the fourth inning. Blumenstein, who defeated Klamath with ease here two weeks ago, relieved Levoff in the fourth and he lasted nearly two innings. Foley stepped into the breach in the sixth and expired in the seventh in favor of a Medford schoolboy twirler whose name could not be learned in the flurry of the closing riot. This young hopeful endured until twilight mercifully closed the slaughter.

Incidentally the game lasted from 2:30 until 6 o'clock Pacific coast time, or a total of three hours and thirty minutes.

Klamath's entire hitting staff of Sage, Silva and Street was called upon during the melee. With just ordinary support either one of the above pitchers would be fully capable of defeating the Pearpickers by a two to one count under the conditions which prevailed yesterday.

Klamath appeared like a team torn with internal dissension, apparently substantiating rumors that one player on the Klamath club was daring his colleagues to physical combat during practice gatherings last week. And speaking of practice, it has been said that the Klamath infield was weakened owing to Fuller, first class short stop being unable to turn out each evening because he works nights at the local railroad yards. To a casual onlooker yesterday, it appeared that Fuller was one of but two or three men on the club who had ever practiced.

Duback, switched to catcher owing to Aiken, regular first baseman, suffering an injury to his back last week, which called King to the first sack, caught a first class game of ball under the circumstances.

Costly errors in the Klamath outfield were the main contributing factors in Klamath's defeat. It appeared after the fifth inning that any ball hit into the Klamath outfield was good for anything from two bases to a home run. Dunn and Long were each credited with circuit

clouts for Medford and for Klamath. Fuller and King checked in homers, and Clark made a home run out of a three bagger when he was blocked by a Medford player at third.

While Klamath was suffering the above recorded indignities at the hands of Medford yesterday, Ashland on its home lot defeated Grants Pass by the one sided score of 9 to 0. Mohler, ex-Pelican left hander, went all the way for the Lithians, holding the Cavemen entirely at his mercy.

EAST AND WEST OARSMEN CLASH IN BIG MEETING

Nineteen Crews Entered;
Washington Contender
for Title Honors

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., June 28.—(P)—The pick of college oarsmen from the far west, middle west and east cleared their decks for action today.

Nineteen crews, numbering 152 sweep-swingers, match their brawn and stamina late this afternoon in three tests of racing speed that carry the championships of the Intercollegiate Rowing association. The titles have special national significance with Washington, California and Wisconsin meeting five eastern rivals—Cornell, Syracuse, Pennsylvania, Columbia and the Naval academy—for supremacy in freshman, junior varsity and varsity races.

Favorable weather and water conditions were indicated for the twenty-ninth championship regatta, with something like 50,000 or more spectators watching from boats and observation trains.

The battle between east and west was clearly marked out. It found Washington and Navy listed to fight it out for the blue ribbon varsity prize which they have held between them for five successive years; Washington again, and Pennsylvania booked to furnish the chief fight for the junior varsity title; California and Columbia slated to make bids for freshman honors.
