

# STOCKS SURGE QUICKLY UPWARD

NEW YORK, June 29. — (AP) — The upward movement of stocks prices was resumed with increased vigor today under the impressive leadership of U. S. Steel common, which mounted to a record high figure above 140.

The advance which took place in the face of stiff money rates, carried a score of more other representative industrials one to six points with a marked expansion in the volume of trade.

Favorable news from the iron trade, including reports that the demand for pig iron was the best since 1924 and that the present movement would exceed a million tons, caused the remarkable strength of the steel shares.

Chemical shares also gave a good exhibition of group strength.
