

HUSKIES WINNER IN GREAT HUDSON RACE STRUGGLE

Naval Academy, in Desperate Spurt, Loses by 12 Feet at Finish Line

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., June 29. (AP)—The University of Washington's eight mighty huskies once again rule the intercollegiate seas. Through four miles of a tranquil Hudson, with the shadows of twilight deepening, the Pacific Coast stalwarts, pupils of the famous Rusty Callow, pulled their way to victory by a dozen feet over the Naval Academy eight in yesterday's classic climax to the annual regatta of the intercollegiate rowing association. Washington won by the margin of a second, barely a full stroke, in one of the fastest four mile races on record, as well as one of the most vigorous.

A Callow coached eight also romped home with the junior varsity race in the same fashion, leaving Columbia's amassing victory in the Freshman race as the only consolation for the east.

No such overthrow of eastern talent has occurred before in the 29 years in the rowing history.

The other race among the six crews that followed the leaders became a march for Syracuse, which landed third place by two lengths. Then came Pennsylvania, Columbia, California, Wisconsin and Cornell.

Washington's victory in the junior varsity at three miles left Penn a length and a half behind, California third, Syracuse fourth, Cornell fifth.

In the freshman two mile race Columbia won by two lengths with California second then Syracuse, Penn and Cornell.

The Washington varsity time of 19 minutes 28.3 seconds was 34-3.5 seconds behind the record set by Cornell in 1910.

Billy Harris is in better condition than in any previous appearance here, in preparation for his mingle with Jack Crim, but despite this, Jack is favored to win.

In his last fight he demonstrated his ability to fight as well as box, and with the memory of the resultant victory still fresh in his mind, he is figured to cop the honors.

Local fandom is all heated up on the subject of the Dotson-Starkey mill.

Dotson, winner of their last and only match, will be unable to repeat in any such whirlwind fashion as before, fans are almost unanimously agreed.

He has Starkey bested as regards speed and hitting, but is not his equal in condition or ruggedness.
