

MRS. M'PHERSON ASKS NO CREDIT FOR AIDING SICK

**Says She Merely Preaches
Salvation and That Heal-
ing Is Done by Faith**

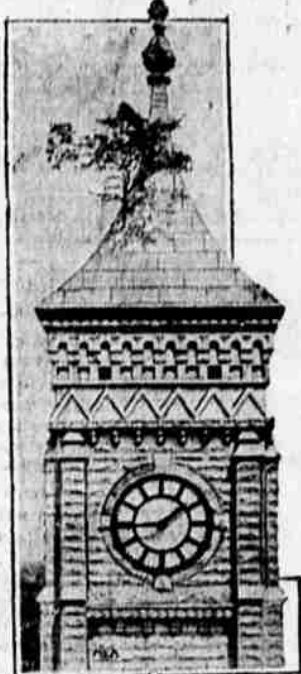
LOS ANGELES, June 29.—(AP)—Aimee Semple McPherson, evangelist, center of a kidnaping story which authorities are now investigating, who took exception to the designation applied to her of "self-styled healer" at the request of the Associated Press has made a signed statement of her religious dealings, particularly with regard to the divine healing advertised in the Los Angeles newspapers under the name of Angelus Temple, her headquarters. The statement follows:

"I preach salvation from sin. Men and women come to the altar, confess their sin and are saved. I have led them to the altar and prayed for them, it is true, but how absurd it would be to say 'I am a savior, here is a man that I saved.' 'Likewise, I preach Jesus Christ, the great physician, all sufficient for body as well as soul. Men and women come to the altar and touch the hem of His garment and have been healed of many diseases, in answer to believing prayer. Yet I would not say that I was a 'healer' or 'here is a man that I have healed.'"

"Just as Jesus Christ is the Savior, so he is the healer and receives all the glory."

"Divine healing in answer to our prayer is not something peculiar to our church. Other churches have always prayed for the sick. The Episcopal churches have lately been known throughout the land for the

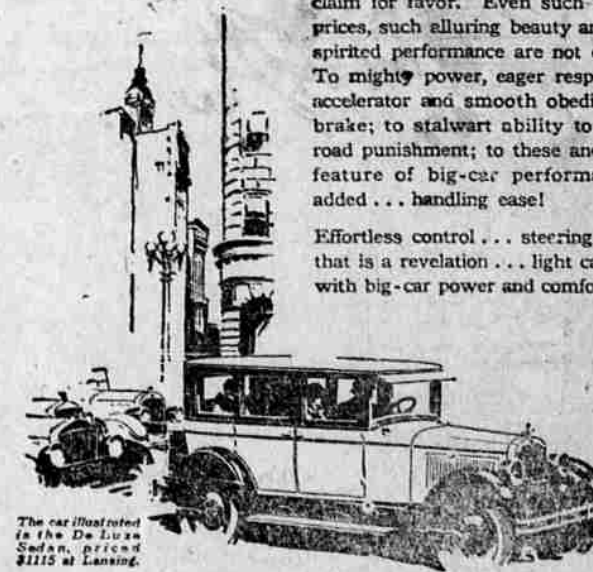
OFF AGAIN
