Klamath Day At Chiloquin To Be Monday

Caravan of Local Cars To Make Trip to Neighbor City

Monday July 5 has been set by royal proclamation of Mayor A. C. Glenger of Chiloquin as Klamath Falls day at the reservation city's three day natal jubilee. "She's Wild!"

At the directors meeting of the chamber of commerce today it was decided to line up a caravan of Klamath cars to make the trip to Chiloquin that day. E. H. Halsiger and Ed Vannice were appointed to make arrangements for this caravan.

It was also proposed to make an effort to send an airplane from Klamath Falls to Alturas on July 1, which has been set aside as the Klamath day at the Modoc county celebration. Lynn Sablin was appointed as a committee to investigate the cost of making the flight and to procure circulars bearing the legend "Welcome from Klamath Falls; we would be here by the thousands if we had good roads." These circulars are to be scattered over the crowd by their pilot.

Death Claims Real Pioneer, Age 110

Bessie Jackson Tecumseh, one of the oldest residents of this county is dead at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Port Summers, at Klamath Agency. The aged lady, one of the well known Indians of the reservation, had reached the age of 110.

For the past three years, Mrs. Tecumseh has been an invalid due to a paralytic stroke. Despite her

illness she retained her mental faculties to the end and passed away surrounded by her relatives and close friends.

A widow of the late Tecumseh who with David Hill was taken to Washington by Captain E. Applegate at the close of the Modoc War, the family will be remembered by many of the old pioneers. This courtesy which was extended to Tecumseh was in the end responsible for his death. Jealousy which existed among the tribesmen brought his death, 27 years ago. He was ambushed by a man who later was taken in this city.

The funeral services will be conducted from the family home at the Agency with Clark-Towey in charge. Rev. Polindexter will officiate and interment will take place in the Wilson cemetery.
