School Contracts Given to Bidders

Contracts for the construction of a new school at Chiloquin, a new school supply warehouse and three additions to school buildings were let at a meeting of the school board yesterday afternoon. The contracts totaled \$36,892.44. Louis E. Selberg of Portland was low bidder on the Chiloquin school with \$23,509. C. C. McNeely was low with a bid of \$7,015.15 for construction of a three room addition to the Chiloquin school, Karl B. Gentry with a bid of \$2509.95 was given the contract for building one room at the Kono school, and he also got the contract for building an addition of one room on the Mt. Laki school at a cost of \$3181.84. T. H. Westfall will build a school warehouse for \$685.50. Bids for the Altamont and Olene schools will be called next week.

NEW YORK, July 1. — (AP) — Forty thousand garment workers went on strike today. Sixteen hundred shops are affected. The strike demands include wage increases and a minimum of thirty six weeks employment throughout the year.
