day.

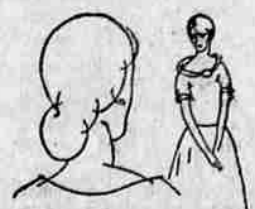

1100 feet railway frontage, from the
possession of Joel T. Ward and
Wilson S. Wiley to the recently in-
corporated Ewauna Park corpora-
tion.

Consideration, while not made
public, was reported as \$36,000.

Site of the tract is three miles
south of Klamath Falls, on the
main line of the Southern Pacific, at
the junction of the proposed Modoc
Northern. The new Klamath Falls-
Weed highway, now under construc-
tion, runs through the property,
which is in the heart of Klamath
Falls industrial district.

A reservoir site to supply homes
in the subdivision has been selected
and plans have been drawn for a
60,000-gallon storage reservoir, to
be 32 feet in diameter, of stone
and concrete.

The reservoir will be located on
the hill 150 feet above the lake
level, insuring good gravity pres-
sure.

Engineering work, under the su-
pervision of John C. Cleghorn, has
been such as to result in streets
which preserve natural beauties of
the land contours.

Streets have been named after
native trees and shrubs of Oregon.
Manzanita way being the principal
drive through the property.
