

Educator Defends Prohibition Talk

CHICAGO, July 2.—(AP)—Dr. Arnold B. Hall of the political department of the University of Chicago, and president-elect of the University of Oregon, has declared that his remarks relative to prohibition at the Commonwealth conference at Iowa City, Iowa, on June 29, had been misinterpreted.

He was reported as attacking the Eighteenth amendment as a national scandal, but explained in a statement he had referred to failure to enforce prohibition as a scandal.

He questioned the wisdom of the prohibition amendment on the ground that prohibition could have been achieved better through state and local action rather than through national legislation.

"I have always been a dry, but I have thought the wiser method of accomplishing this end to be local option first, and through local option the achievement of state-wide prohibition," he said.

"I think by this method we might have had all the country dry today, save four or five states, and that they would have ultimately have followed. The movement against the alcohol traffic is irresistible. The only question I raise is whether we have followed the most scientific enlightened method."
