Brixey, a nurseryman, saw them in a field and fired six shots at them. In speaking of their escape from the penitentiary, the two convicts said they decided to use no guns, as the chances for their recapture were about 75 per cent against them, and they did not want to face a charge of murder in event of their failure to get away.

Moore said they were greatly surprised when they scaled the prison wall at Salem without being detected as they fully expected that some one of their number would be struck by bullets from the guns of guards.

"We simply caught them when they were not looking," said Moore in explaining how the escape was made so easily.

Moore complained bitterly over the treatment he received in the bull pen at the penitentiary where he said he was confined for 60 days after the dining room riot several months ago.

"It's the bull pen for us again, when they take us back," he said, but neither he nor Franzen seemed to be perturbed by the prospect.

The two men say they had no

definite plans for escape and attributed their capture to lack of knowledge of the country and hunger.

Moore, who is 22 years old, said he had engaged in fifty robberies. Franzen is twenty years old.

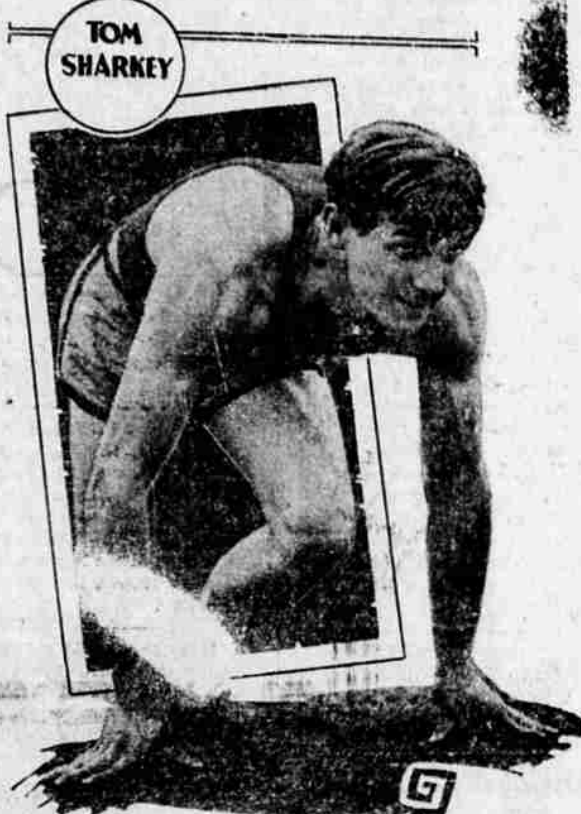
