# 150 MEN FIGHT FIRE IN GRAIN

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# OHIO STRICKEN BY STORM FURY

Central Illinois Also Reports Two Killed and One Hurt by Lightning

COLUMBUS, Ohio, July 7. — (AP) — Ohioans are taking stock today of the damage done by storms which swept many parts of the state yesterday apparently with relentless fury heightened by winds, heavy rains and spectacular displays of lightning. The storm extended to central Illinois where two persons were killed and one seriously hurt by lightning.

Damage totaling thousands of dollars was caused by the storm and at least four persons were injured in Ohio. Losses in Columbus and vicinity were reported to have reached \$100,000 and the damage at Dayton was placed even higher. Damages were still unestimated today in many sections.

During the second storm at New Concord, nearby, a natural gas well was fired when a bolt struck the region. The flames were controlled with difficulty.

Many trees and telephone poles were blown over at Dayton, which seemingly was hardest hit by the storm. The city was without telephone service for hours and for two hours only one of the interurban lines running through the city was in use because of blown down wires. The rain almost reached the dimensions of a blizzard.

City street car service in Columbus and Dayton was paralyzed for more than an hour and a half.

## Rabbit Breeders Schedule Meeting

Plans will be laid tonight for a big rabbit exhibit at the Klamath county fair this fall, Milner said. "The rabbit breeders intend to show up the poultry men this year in the size and interesting features of their exhibit."

## Wall Board Sales Here Exceed Record

Reflecting a gain in construction activity here, sales of the Schumacher Wall Board corporation in Klamath Falls increased 20 per cent during June, as compared with the preceding month.

Announcement to that effect was made by C. H. Harrington, sales manager for the Seattle division of the corporation, following a tour of the entire Northwest territory during which he made a brief stay in this city.

Mr. Harrington attributed the increasing demand for plaster wall board, plaster bath and other high grade materials to rising building activity here. The extensive advertising campaign now being conducted by the company in the territory is another cause for the increased sales of Schumacher products, he said.

"The market for our products has expanded to a considerable extent since the recent launching of a new sales effort in this section," he said. "This particularly has been the case

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with plaster lath, which we have been manufacturing in a small volume at Seattle. To adequately supply the demand for the product, installation of a machine for its manufacture has just been completed at our Seattle plant at a cost of \$25,000.

## Veteran Walks



Sergeant James H. Duffy

Sergeant James H. Duffy arrived in Klamath Falls on the last lap of a 49,000 mile journey in the interests of the John Hopkins university.

During his service in the war, Duffy was engaged in numerous battles, gassed, wounded and captured by the Germans.

When he was discharged from the army he was given up as a hopeless cripple and victim of war gas.

The John Hopkins university at the close of the war began to search for a cure for America's war victims and selected 18 veterans for a 49,000 mile hike, believing that fresh air and walking would strengthen the gassed men.

When Duffy started out he weighed 115 pounds. In Klamath Falls today, after six years and five months of walking, he was a huge man, weighing 235 pounds. He bears the marks of five different shells. Despite his efforts, Duffy still is suffering from gas and in each city where he stops in which there is a veterans' hospital, he takes treatment.

Besides Duffy, only one other veteran is still in the Hopkins experiment test. Upon completion of the 49,000 miles, each will receive \$25,000 and an automobile. Wherever he stops, Duffy leaves a pedometer with the postmaster so that it may be checked and reported to the Hopkins university.

## Bridges Burned; Detour Arranged
