

NEW YORK FEELS STRIKE EFFECTS

Subway Strife Forces Thousands to Find New Ways To Go to Work

NEW YORK, July 7. — (AP) — Father Knickerbocker and family are getting some unwanted exercise — walking.

The cause is a strike in his pet subway, which forms a huge hole beneath the surface of Manhattan Island and enables the New Yorker normally to get quickly from any part of the island to any other part as the result of high speed, express and local service in the four track service.

The first day of the strike saw the number of trains and the speed cut in half. Doubting whether he could get to or from work, the average New Yorker avoided the strike-affected interborough rapid transit company's subways and used other means of transportation including shank's mare. Instead of a step to nearby subway stations, he usually walked block after

block to one of the four elevated lines that parallel the subway. Ordinarily, the elevated is so little used relatively that the Interborough advertises its merits in order to relieve the subway crush.

Hundreds of buses in places saved some residents long walks, buses and cars made heavy congestion in some streets. More than three million people have found their trips to and from business lengthened by any time from 15 minutes to an hour because of the strike of some 700 subway motormen and switchmen for wages of \$1 an hour, a 20 per cent increase.

In contrast to the number of strikers, some 25,000 traction employees are remaining at work including those on the interborough and other companies. One subway in downtown Manhattan and Brooklyn is not affected by the strike.

The second day of the strike opened with the strikers claiming support of the motormen and switchmen on the elevated trains. Sixty elevated employees were said to have joined the walkout during the night.

NORSE RUIN IS CLAIMED TO DATE BACK CENTURIES

SPOKANE, Wash., July 7. — (AP) — Vivid runes and writings of Norse explorations were written, painted and carved on several cliffs in the Pacific Northwest, by the same expedition that battled Indians near Spokane in 1010 A. D., Professor Opsjon divulged here today.

In revealing other discoveries of ruins in this region, Opsjon, who is the author of numerous articles on Norse history, declared they verified his translations of Runic inscriptions found just outside of Spokane last Monday.

The tale of the exciting struggle between 24 Vikings and a band of here is almost excelled by the other ancient markings, Professor Opsjon said.

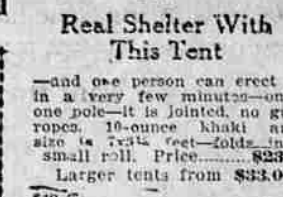

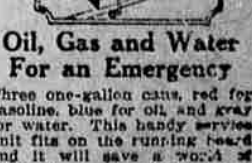

While a number of witnesses received grand jury subpoenas Mrs. McPherson was not at the Angelus temple when process servers arrived. It is expected she will be served today.

"If they don't come out here with it, I'll call them up and ask them to bring it out," the evangelist said, speaking of the subpoena. "Why, it is a great load off my mind to know that the grand jury is to hear my story."

The first witnesses in the case will be heard tomorrow by the grand jurors. Those subpoenaed include, among others, Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, the pastor's mother; Miss Emma Schaeffer, the evangelist's secretary, who was the first to report her disappearance when she vanished at Ocean Park, May 18; Rolf McPherson and Roberta Semple, the religious leader's children, and H. D. Hallenbeck, close confidant of both the pastor and her mother.
