NEW RECORD SET IN PARK TRAVEL

Last Year's Figures Exceeded by About Forty Per Cent, Day by Day

The growing popularity of Crater Lake National Park is reflected in the figures showing the heavy travel which has already set in to Oregon's national playground. Up to the evening of July 8, 7,567 cars entered the park bearing 24,431 visitors as compared with 2,670 cars and 9,468 visitors on the same date last year. His increase is due largely to the early opening of the park, but day after day travel this year is exceeding last year's figures for the same date by about 40 per cent, according to a bulletin issued by C. G. Thomson, park superintendent.

All records were broken on July 4th when 945 cars bore 3,395 people through the park gates, almost exactly double any previous record. This throng was handled without even a minor mishap. A large number of people are going

on to Diamond Lake after their stay at the park. There is a heavy increase in travel over the Dallas-California highway to Bend and thence via the beautiful McKenzie Pass. The completion of this road forms another fine scenic loop through Crater Lake National Park and this year has brought a six hundred per cent increase in travel through the East entrance.

The park is functioning in every respect. All roads are open, the nature guide service is organized and all of the usual park facilities in full use. There are no detours whatsoever and there will be none throughout the season. There have been no forest fires within the park, the skies are cool and clear and the daily thermometer is from 40 to 78 degrees, ideal weather for camping and outdoor recreation.

PORTLAND PLANS LARGER THEATRE

Famous Players-Lasky Plan Construction of \$2,000,000 Edifice

(AP)—A two million dollar theatre to be occupied by the Famous Lasky concern to occupy an entire block will be designed by New York theatre architects and is expected to be one of the most magnificent theatres west of New York.

It was estimated the equipment alone would cost \$250,000, including a \$125,000 pipe organ. Its seating capacity will be 3,500.

Taking into consideration rentals involved and cost of construction, the deal involves in excess of \$11,000,000 probably the largest deal of its kind in the history of Portland.

ENGINES FAIL; SHIP RETURNS
