

Sportsmen Shelve Averill's Protest

LA GRANDE, Ore., July 13. (AP) The Wing, Pin and Fleetfoot club of Union county, at its annual fish feed here last night, did not take kindly to a suggestion by State Game Warden E. F. Averill to abolish fish banquets in connection with angling contests. Two hundred club members present voted unanimously to continue the dinners, and file Mr. Averill's letter. The club also voted to conduct a campaign against skunks on the game reserve on Governor Walter M. Pierce's farm near La Grande. Game Warden John Walden reported that the skunks are killing a large number of game birds.

33 Arrested In Past Month Here On Rum Charges

State Men Assist in Making But One Capture

Out of 33 arrests for liquor violations for the month of June, but one arrest was made wherein a state officer participated. This was due to Officer McBride, the only state man now working in the Klamath territory, being absent for the greater part of the month. It was explained at the sheriff's office. The officers most active here now are either federal men or deputies under Sheriff Hawkins. STATE HUNTERS ISSUE REPORTS

276 Predatory Animals Killed During the Month of June

The following is a report of the trapping activities carried on throughout the state of Oregon during the month of June by men in the department of predatory animal control. The report comes from the office of Stanley G. Jewett, head of the predatory animal department. During June 34 hunters, working 982 days, turned in 241 coyotes, 30 bobcats and five stock-killing bears, a total of 276 predatory animals. In addition, 155 badgers, 175 porcupines and 13 skunks were destroyed, no part of which was saved. An average of eight predatory animals per man per thirty days was taken during June. In addition to these animals, hunters killed 1,242 porcupines, 974 badgers, of which no part was saved. Countless numbers of ravens and magpies were also destroyed. Hunter Frank Robeson, assisted by Reservation Warden Johnson, has been detailed to clean up the ravens and other predatory birds and animals on Malheur lake national bird reservation. These birds destroy untold thousands of eggs and newly-hatched young of ducks, geese and other water fowl annually. During the month of June a total of 624 of these birds were killed on or adjacent to the reservation. This will mean the saving of a large number of ducks and geese in that territory.

Famed Liquor Seller Jolted

Quartier Must Serve 90 Days and Pay \$350 Fine

SALEM, Ore., July 13. (AP) William Quartier, who formerly was in the limelight in Portland in connection with liquor cases and who was once the husband of Dolly Quartier who for a time was known as the "Queen of the bootleggers" must serve 90 days in jail in Polk county and pay a fine of \$350 as the result of a supreme court decision here today. The opinion, written by Justice Rand, affirms the lower court conviction where the case was tried by Judge W. M. Ramsay. Quartier was charged with selling intoxicating liquor. He was arrested December 22, 1925, at Independence. In the appeal to the supreme court Quartier's attorneys made three assignments of error on the part of the trial judge in his instructions to the jury, all of which are overruled by the supreme court. Dolly Quartier is now doing time in the state penitentiary for arson.

Trusty Flees In Fire Excitement

SALEM, Ore., July 13. (AP) Thirty acres of wheat and oats, most of it the property of the state penitentiary, was destroyed by fire on the Turner road three miles southeast of Salem yesterday afternoon. One of the trustees from the prison, James Shields, found opportunity to disappear during the fire and has not yet been captured.

200 Men Fight Longview Fire

Logged-off Timber Catches From Donkey Sparks

LONGVIEW, Wash., July 13. (AP) Two hundred men today are fighting a stubborn blaze in a logged-off area five miles east of Ostrander,

Wash., which started from sparks from a donkey engine in Camp 1 of the Ostrander Railway and Timber company last night. Fighters were backfiring, confining themselves to efforts to keep the blaze from a stand of green timber. A crew of 54 men is fighting a forest fire six miles east of Morton, in Lewis county, which started near the Vanlow mill Thursday. The blaze reached the top of a mountain east of Glesoma postoffice and threatens one of the finest fir bodies in the state.
