

ALL CASCADE FIRES COVERED

EUGENE, Ore., July 14. (AP)—All fires in the Cascade national forest are under control today, according to Nelson F. MacDuff, superintendent of the forest. There are no new fires reported.

Fire, which started Monday in the J. H. Chambers timber west of Cottage Grove is now under control. There are several fires in the Bohemia mine district, one of which is reported to be gaining headway.

Thirteen fires were reported in the Oak Ridge district Monday, but they are all under control now.

WORLD DASH IS FINISHED WITH NEW RECORD SET

Evans and Linton Complete Circuit of Globe in 28 Days and 14 Hours

NEW YORK, July 14. (AP)—More than a week was cut from the time in which man can circle the earth when Edward S. Evans and Linton O. Wells arrived at the Pulitzer building at 4 p. m. today. They left on their world girdling race against time at 1:30 a. m. June 16 making their elapsed time 28 days 14 hours. The previous record of 35 days 21 hours and 35 minutes, was made in 1913 by John Henry Mears.

MITCHELL FIELD, N. Y., July 14. (AP)—Edward S. Evans and Linton O. Wells arrived by airplane at 3 p. m. daylight time today and speeded for New York by automobile to complete their trip around the world for a new "globe-trotting" record.

The last lap of their flight was from Rantoul, Ill., which they left at 4:55 a. m. central standard time today.

They left New York on June 16 at 1:30 a. m. hoping to travel around the earth in 28 days. They missed their mark by a number of hours, but smashed the 35 day record of John Henry Mears, made 13 years ago.

CLEVELAND, Ore., July 14. (AP)—The plane bearing Edward Evans hopped off from the Brook Park airport here on the final leg of the round the world trip at 9:43 a. m. and Linton Wells' plane started two minutes later. They expect to reach New York in about four hours and ten minutes.

The globe girdlers reached Cleveland in two army airplanes from Chanute, Ill., where they spent the night. Wells declared he expected to reach New York about 2 p. m. eastern standard time, cutting the world's record by about seven days.

With only two meals in the past two days, Wells and Evans were tired and hungry. They ate dinner Monday evening and their next meal was dinner last night. Since that time they have had but two cups of coffee.

"I can't wait until we get to New York," Evans said, "so I can hit the hay. We've had only six hours sleep in the last two days."

"We have had more trouble with airplanes in this country than we had anywhere in Europe," Wells said while waiting for his plane to take on gasoline. "The purpose of our trip was in the interest of

aviation and we find that American aviation is greatly in need of development," he said.

COOLIDGE WILL NOT RUN, VIEW OF IOWA SOLON

Democrats Conceded in Some Quarters to Have Good chance for Wins

CHICAGO, July 14. (AP)—With the presidential election still two years away, expressions by political leaders on the coming battle and on this fall's senatorial and congressional fights already are beginning to be heard.

Senator Albert B. Cummins of Iowa has voiced a prediction that President Coolidge will not be a candidate for re-election; C. Hanson "Slomp" believes that speaker Nicholas Longworth has a place in the picture of the next presidential campaign if Coolidge is not a candidate and Franklin D. Roosevelt sees the next senate and possibly the house democratic.

Senator Cummins, who was defeated in the recent republican primary by Colonel Smith W. Brookhart, also expressed an opinion on his arrival at Des Moines from Washington that the present nominal republican majority in the upper house might disappear with the November election.

"One doesn't know that President Coolidge will be a candidate or that he wants to be a candidate," said Senator Cummins. "My own prediction is that he will not be a candidate. I think he will have had enough of it by that time. It is an immense task and few men last through it."

Mr. Slomp, former secretary to President Coolidge, discussed some possible republican candidates during a visit to Cincinnati, the home city of Mr. Longworth, speaker of the house of representatives in the event that the president does not run again. Mr. Slomp saw Longworth, Lowden, Dawes, Hoover and Watson loom as presidential timber.

Graveyard Visit As Stomach Cure Causes Revolt

BOSTON, July 14. (AP)—Fear of a prescribed midnight visit to a graveyard as a cure for stomach trouble led Jos Seana to report to the police the treatment given him by Mary Jones, a gypsy fortune teller. She was fined \$100 in court today.

Seana said he had paid her \$10 to massage his face to cure his rheumatic knee and when that failed, she extended the massage to his neck and chest for \$50 more. Then she demanded \$500, he charged, for her advice to go to a cemetery at midnight, undress and light a candle over a new grave to help his stomach disorder. He balked at that.

APRICOTS ARRIVE

PORTLAND, Ore., July 14. (AP)—Scarcity in the apricot market was relieved temporarily yesterday by the arrival of three carloads, one each from Idaho, Washington and The Dalles. Prices range from \$1 to \$1.40 per lug, depending on size and quality.

Warm weather is boosting the melon market. The street is bare of good watermelons, with prices sharply higher. Good Klondikes are very scarce and produce dealers are holding the limited supply at 3 to 3 1/2 cents a pound. Other varieties range from 2 to 3 cents, depending on quality.

Nearly All Of Wool Now Sold

PENDLETON, July 14. (AP)—According to Hugh Sprout, secretary of the Oregon Wool Growers' association, practically all of the 1926 wool clip is in the hands of buyers and warehouse men. There is, he estimates, about 1,000,000 out of the 18,000,000 pound clip remaining in the hands of growers. The average price to growers was about 30 cents a pound. The lamb crop, according to the executive, is very good, due to the open winter. There has been little lamb killing in Oregon by predatory animals, due to the good efforts of the United States biological survey department.
