AHLSTROM AWAY

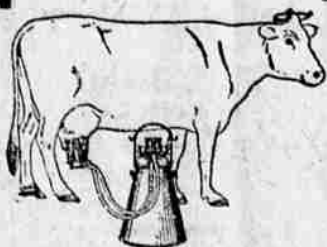
