LA GRANDE, Ore., July 15.—(AP)—Seven addresses and demonstrations are on today's annual home-makers' institute program here, which has been attracting hundreds of women since its beginning Tuesday morning. Those to speak today are: Miss Esther B. Cooley, O. A. C. extension service; Mrs. Beth Bailey McClean, national cooking authority; Professor J. Leo Fairbanks, University of Oregon; Miss Ruby Beers, O. A. C. faculty member; and Dr. C. Ulness Moore, University of Oregon, child specialist and author. The institute closes tomorrow afternoon.

U. S. DRY LEADER NOW IN BRITAIN

Discusses Ways and Means of Further Drying Up Liquor Flow to States

LONDON, July 15.—(AP)—Brigadier General Lincoln C. Andrews, America's prohibition enforcement chief, will have his first meeting with British government officials today to seek ways of putting thumbs in the pathway of the trans-Atlantic bootlegger.

There will be a round table discussion at the foreign office between all the American experts of General Andrews' mission and representatives of the British foreign office, board of trade, admiralty, customs department and colonial office.

It will be explained at this general discussion that the object of the visit of General Andrews and his aids is to discover what Great Britain can do in an administrative way to make the smuggling of liquor into the United States difficult.

After the plenary meeting, it is expected the participants will split into groups for consideration of specific questions, such as smuggling, false declaration of the ultimate destinations of liquor cargoes from British ports and certain proposals for giving American revenue cutters authority to enter British waters in chasing rum runners.

Announcement of the program was made after a conference this morning between General Andrews and the American ambassador, Alanson B. Houghton.

Leaving his hotel for the embassy General Andrews noticed that the doors of the public houses, displaying ale, stout and whiskey signs in big gilt letters were closed. When he asked about this, it was explained that the "pubs" didn't open until 11 o'clock.

"Oh, so you do have a little prohibition here?" he remarked to an Englishman in the party.

"Yes," said the Englishman. "About 15 hours daily."

Chinaman Slain In Tong Affray

SEATTLE, July 15.—(AP)—After a month's war of tongues in the Pacific Northwest, three gunmen slew Charlie Sing, 25 years old, in a street battle here today. Bullets passed close to Ruth Morgan who was watering a lawn.

Sing, who worked for the Tuck Wo company, was listed as a member of the Hip Sing and Hop Sing tong. Police said his slayers belonged to the Bing Kong tong.

Sing was walking along the street when an automobile drew up beside him. Sing drew a pistol. Then two men fired from the automobile. Sing returned the fire as he ran up to the lawn of Rabbi Simon Winograd's home. He fell as he tried to jump behind the porch.

Miss Morgan said that as Sing passed her the third gunman jumped from the automobile and began shooting.

When Sing dropped, the automobile dashed around a corner and fled from sight carrying the three gunmen.
