Berlenbach's Chance To Win Now Increased

NEW YORK, July 16, (AP)—Fair weather was indicated today by the weather bureau for the light heavyweight championship contest between Paul Berlenbach and Jack Delaney at Ebbets field tonight.

NEW YORK, July 16, (AP)—Paul Berlenbach's chances of successful defense of his light heavyweight championship against Jack Delaney tonight increased today with his weight. The champion today was five or six pounds heavier, it was estimated, than when he weighed in. This would give him a ringside advantage of probably ten or more pounds.

Berlenbach looked finely drawn when he tipped the scales yesterday afternoon at 174½, owing to a struggle to reduce to the class limit. Delaney was eight and one-half pounds under the limit at 166½ and although his followers considered Berlenbach's big advantage doubtfully, Delaney maintained he was in the best condition of his career.

Critics estimated Berlenbach will exceed 180 pounds when the principals are called from their corners by the song at 9 p. m. standard time tonight. Delaney, on the other hand, is expected to scale about 170.

Although weights of the two men will be taken, rules of the New York state athletic commission do not require that they make the class limit in the event of a single night's postponement.

At the PINE TREE

For genuine drama, delightful romance and a fascinating study of a man's soul, there have been few pictures this season to equal "Satan in Sabies," starring Lowell Sherman, which opened yesterday at the Pine Tree theatre.

Bradley King's story of a disolute prince who lived for pleasure, regardless of the pain and tragedy he left in his wake, is ideally suited to the expert talents of Lowell Sherman, whose extensive success as a stage and screen villain is capped by this brilliantly fascinating performance.

Little Pauline Garon provides the beauty that helps change the entire course of this modern satan's life. Gertrude Astor appears as Dolores, his mistress, and makes this study in jealous womanhood an outstanding part of the production. Then there is John Harmon, as Michael's younger brother, a clean, decent youth, whose protection is the one redeeming light in Michael's dark career. Miss Garon and Mr. Harmon are effective contrasts of youth and romance to the blasé poise and sophistication of Prince Michael and Dolores.

The remainder of the cast, ably directed by James Flood, is excellent. With contrasts of background of picturesque wealth and honest poverty, of the transfiguring power of love and tragedy in a self-centered and shallow life, and of the dramatic struggle between a man's good and evil genius, "Satan in Sabies" comes as one of the most powerful productions of the season.

At The LIBERTY

One of the most thrilling rescues ever screened, and one in which Tom Tyler, new western star, nearly lost his life, contained in "The series featuring the handsome young cowboy Musketeer," third of the athlete, now playing at the Liberty Theater. In the story Lolla Gordon plunges through the rickety rail of an old bridge to her fussy little Ford, and is swept down stream in the icy waters. Tyler, riding along the trail near the road, sees the accident and gallops downstream along the bank. Fastening his lariat to the pommel of his saddle, and with the other end around his waist, he leaps into the torrent and catches the girl just before she is swept over the edge of the falls. Then the intelligent horse, trained to answer the faint rope on the saddle, backs up the bank and pulls the two struggling figures ashore. So much the script called for; but the rope somehow slipped from the saddle horn when they first shot the scene, with the result that Tyler and Frances Darc, his leading lady, actually went over the falls locked in each other's arms. It could not have happened safely more than once in ten times, but fortunately neither was injured. The scare did not bother either of them, apparently, and after seeing that such a mishap could not occur again, the scene was shot over with splendid results.
