BYRD'S PICTORIAL LOG IS AWE-INSPIRING FILM

Some idea of the fascination, the mystery and the lure that the North Pole possesses for dauntless souls may be glimpsed tonight at the Pine Tree Theatre, where "With Lieut. Com. Byrd, U. S. N., in America's Polar Triumph," is being unfolded.

When the giant Fokker skims over the icy wastes in the proximity of the North Pole there is a thrill for the spectators the like of which has never been brought to the silver screen. It portrays man's crowning effort of conquest, eclipsing in interest the journey over vast oceans and wide reaches of the air, the lure of gold that has taken men into a million dangers, the trails that have led into fever-infested jungles.

The trials and tribulations of the daring party before the machine rose on its final flight, the journey on and above the glimmering landscape, the return flight and welcome back from the land where death ever lurked are recounted in film episodes that once seen never be forgotten. Society and jazz films, pictures dealing in morals and mannerisms fade into insignificance before this masterpiece that depicts dauntless courage, pluck and perseverance. Sets and scenic drops, powder and paint and Kleig lights have no place where nature's "props" have endured for an eternity. ## STAGE FRIGHT IN INITIAL INNING LOSES FOR PELICANS

Suffering from stage fright in the first inning, the Klamath Pelicans permitted the Ashland Lithians to stampee five runs across in the first inning on one hit at Ashland yesterday, thereby permitting the carbonated boys to win the game by a score of 6 to 3.

After the first inning it was a pitcher's battle between Split Ball Davis of Ashland and Hook Ball Davidson of Klamath Falls, with honors practically even. The Pelicans tightened up after the terrible first inning and gave Davidson excellent support. Salva Davis, for Ashland, was unhittable up until the fifth inning, allowing the Pelicans nothing more dangerous than a fat foul.

In the first inning Matty Mathews, who played a good game at left field, rapped out a sizzling two-bagger, which got between the Ashland right fielder's legs, but that worthy quickly recovered the pill and made a sweet throw to third, where Mathews arrived only a foot ahead of the ball. Umpire Perkins for Ashland dashed over, then stroled out to the pitcher's box, where he decided Mathews was out. On one occasion Perkins tried to wave a Klamath runner back to second from third, where the runner had reached from first on an overthrow by Ashland. On this play the umpire-in-chief overruled Perkins.

Apparently Perkins' bad decisions, all of which seemed to hit Klamath, were due principally to ignorance of the game, as was the case over here a week ago.

Frenchie Hayness at third yesterday played a nice game of ball and looked good back at his old corner. Brady Montgomery played a firstclass game at second, taking a number of difficult chances without a bobble. Klamath had a new catcher in yesterday's game, Pitts of Dunsmuir. His catching was on the loose order and his hitting was off color.

For Ashland Captain Red Watts played a nice game of ball, as did John Logan, right fielder, who made two beautiful running catches off Pelican fouls, pretty putouts in any league.

Ashland gathered a total of seven hits off Davidson in the full nine

innings and Klamath garnered five off Davis from the fifth to the ninth.
