EUGENE, Ore., July 21. (AP)—The Presbyterian synod of Oregon ended its 26th annual session here last night, after making committee appointments and tabling the resolution to tax each member \$1 in order to raise money to construct an administration building at the Children's farm near Corvallis.

bers of the synod explained that this tax, together with that which will be levied by the national board in raising a fund of \$29,000,000 would be too much for the church members to undertake. The national fund is to be used for ministerial pensions and the care of families of ministers.
