According to reports from Saltese the car was turned to the edge of the road to pass another machine and a heavy dust cloud prevented the driver from seeing the embankment.

COOLIDGE BEGINS PELICANS FIGURE TO THINK ABOUT VICTORY SURE IN LAWS FOR FARMS MEDFORD TUSSE

Ohio Solon Goes to President and Gets Promise to Take Home With Him

PAUL SMITH'S, N. Y., July 22. (AP)—Predicting that there would be a move in the next congress to strengthen what already has been done by the administration for farm relief, Senator Fess, republican, Ohio, left White Pine camp today after a visit with President Coolidge, asserting that this would not be along uneconomic lines or in the direction of price fixing.

Fess declared the movement to strengthen the steps already taken for farm relief would be along sound economic lines with special attention to the cooperative marketing and then only in ways that experience with the present legislation demonstrated to be wise.

In his opinion there will be no serious movement in the West against the tariff where, he said, 92% of the farm products are sold in this country and the West is dependent upon the purchasing power of the East which needs tariff protection to prosper.

There has been a serious situation in sections of the West, the senator asserted, particularly in some states like Iowa, where there is heavy mortgage indebtedness and the banks have loaned on inflated values.

The whole situation, Mr. Fess continued, is one growing out of the war. Other industries took their losses, he said, but the farmer did not, although he is now gradually recovering.

President Coolidge, he said, is as popular as ever and has lost little if any of his real strength in the country. In Ohio, particularly, Mr. Fess added, the president is more than holding his own and is stronger than his party.

BOGUS CREEK BLAZE STILL RAGES, WORD

Now Burning on Lower Slopes of Klamath River

The fire at Bogus creek, fifteen miles southwest of Dorris is still out of control and is now burning on the lower slopes of the Klamath river, according to information phoned to the Klamath Forest Protective Association today.

No definite word has been received on the big destructive blaze which has swept 10,000 acres of timber near LaReview.

Klamath fires are all out or well under control according to Jack Kimball, head of the local association.

ESTIMATE TIMBER LOSS

Dr. J. M. Miller and Dr. J. E. Patterson of the United States Bureau of Entomology, arrived in Klamath Falls yesterday and will take up an immediate survey of the loss of timber by both beetles and fire in the timbered area south and west of Klamath Falls.

The country to be surveyed by the government men includes the Aspen lake, Clover creek, and Keno sections, where fire caused considerable damage several weeks ago.
