(AP)—Police were asked to aid in the search for Edith Hurst, 8, who was reported to have been picked up in an east side street at 8 o'clock last night and carried away in a taxi-cab. The child's grandmother, Mrs. Catherine Queris, made the request. Police detectives said they had information that it was the child's mother who took her.

The child was being kept by the grandmother while the parents were in California.

Officers traced a man and woman with the child as far as Salem, where they were reported to have purchased tickets for Los Angeles.

Truck Company To Receive Rehearing

SALEM, Ore., July 22. (AP)—The state public service commission will today file in the supreme court a petition for rehearing of the Purple Truck Garage case in which the court recently held that automotive carriers engaged in private contracts were not subject to license and regulation under the automotive transportation act.

The ruling deprives the commission of revenues in excess of \$10,000 a year. It holds that such vehicles are private and not common carriers.

CROISAN FAVORED FOR U. S. OFFICE

Salem Pioneer May Land Position as Portland Custom Collector

SALEM, Ore., July 22. (AP)—E. M. Croisan, Salem pioneer and old warhorse Republican of this section of the Willamette valley, has received the joint recommendation of United States Senators McNary and Stanfield for appointment as collector of customs for this district to succeed Earl McFarland, deceased, of Portland, according to a telegram received from Senator McNary by his brother, John H. McNary of this city. The appointment requires confirmation by the senate, but John McNary considers it likely that President Coolidge will immediately make a recess appointment of Croisan.

Croisan is a native of Marion county and in the earlier days was active in politics. He started his political career in 1884, when he was appointed deputy sheriff for this county under John Minto, later postmaster at Portland and warden at the state penitentiary. Croisan served as deputy under Minto until 1888, when he was elected sheriff in turn, being re-elected in 1890 and serving until 1892. In 1903 he was elected state senator from Marion county, serving until 1907. While senator he introduced the bill by which the state purchased the land at Champcoog, where there is now a state park commemorating the eventful formation of provisional government in Oregon. With Senator Brownell of Clackamas he was the only supporter of the 1903 eight hour bill in the senate and he was one of the strongest advocates of legislation leading up to the Lewis and Clark fair in Portland.

Before serving in the state senate he was superintendent of the state reform school for boys here, serving from 1897 to 1900 under Governor Lord.

Croisan is a large property holder in this district, is widely known through this section, and Croisan creek, a well known stream of this vicinity, was named for him.
