

Star Six Makes Climb To Crater With High Gear

Believed First Auto to Ever Accomplish Feat

To reach the Lodge on the rim of Crater Lake with a new Star Six, making the entire trip from Klamath Falls without shifting gears, was the accomplishment this morning of "Monty" Hamaker, local Star distributor, driving one of the new models and accompanied by a Herald representative as witness. This is believed to be the first car ever to surmount the summit without changing gears.

The start was made at 4:10 a. m. in an effort to miss traffic which might otherwise have necessitated a halt.

On arrival at the Lodge the car was met by officials of the park. At the top, despite the grueling grind to which it had been subjected, the Star easily made 40 miles per hour on the last long stretch.

Breakfast was eaten at the Lodge, before starting the return.

A high-light of the climb was the fact that there were only six gallons of gas in the car at the start and of this amount about one-half gallon remained at the finish.

The indicator on the motorometer crossed the line into red territory only once, at completion of the climb. No water was added during the trip.

The time was—very good. Any one wanting exact figures on the speed traveled may obtain the information from Mr. Hamaker.
