Another Klamath brewery closed its door yesterday with the arrest of W. H. Hollister by Deputy Sheriff C. H. Bennett.

Hollister, who has been manufacturing the beer in a tent house, six miles north of Klamath Falls on the west side of upper Klamath

lake, entered a plea of guilty before Justice of the Peace R. A. Emmitt and was fined \$100 and costs. Twenty pints of beer were confiscated.

NATION DECLARED TO DEPEND UPON STRONG STATES

Need for Solidarity Im- pressed Upon Governors in Wyoming Conference

CHEYENNE, Wyo., July 26. — (AP) — Promotion of the solidarity of the states, upon which "the greatness of the nation depends" is the chief purpose of the twelfth annual governors' conference, Nellie Taylor Ross, governor of Wyoming, told the assembled state executives at the opening of their three-day meeting here today.

Picturing the west as a "new land possessing unlimited possibilities," America's first woman governor expressed the hope that the visit by the score or more of governors would "result in permanent benefits to your states and ours."

"It is our earnest hope that you may see here such evidence of constructive achievement as will impress you that the winning of the west was an enterprise well worth the sacrifice and the effort which it entailed," she said, "and that the unlimited possibilities it presents for still further development are worthy of utmost co-operation between the people and the government, both state and federal."

"You can readily see that owing to the vast area of this section and to the limitations of population, extensive development presents a stupendous problem. For, while every state has its own individual interests, beneath all their differences our greatness as a nation depends upon the strength of each separate one, together with the common devotion of all the citizens to these ideals upon which free government was founded. And just so far as the welfare of each state is promoted, just so far will the interests of all these people of the country be served."

"Recognition of the interdependence of the states cannot be evaded. All are dependent, one upon the other for those necessities, whether they are manufactured products, cotton, wool, beef or coal, for the production of which each particular section is best adapted. In my opinion the chief purpose the governors' conference serves is to promote solidarity among the states to stimulate general interest in these problems and conditions which relate to them all or only sections. Undoubtedly through the interchange of views and experiences there must be evolved the solution of many difficult problems, particularly where there may be a conflict of interest and at the same time there is developed a more sympathetic understanding among states which is so desirable. And the effect of the discussions and the associations of the conference must be to develop in every governor a more tolerant attitude toward all the states."

Company Changes Name to Conform With Advertising

SAN FRANCISCO, July 26. — M. J. Brandenstein & Co., one of the largest tea importers and coffee roasters in the country, has changed its name to the M. J. B. Co. Because constant advertising has so popularized these initials, and because they are shorter and easier to write than the extended name, the trade has for many years addressed the firm as "M. J. B. Co." It was therefore thought best to take official notice of a change unofficially adopted long ago.

The Brandenstein name dates back to 1850, when Joseph Brandenstein entered the mercantile business in San Francisco. Three of his sons, business as partners. Two of the brothers, Manfred and M. J. Brandenstein, who died in recent years, were prominent figures in the social and mercantile circles of San Francisco. The latter was a director of the Panama Pacific International Exposition.

Edward Brandenstein, who has been later went into the tea and coffee

associated with the M. J. Brandenstein company since 1893, is the president of the new M. J. B. company. He said yesterday: "The new name indicates no change whatever in the essential structure or personnel of the company. It simply marks the growth and the development of an institution out of what started as a personal enterprise."

Several years ago, after a widespread public demand for M. J. B. coffee and Tea tea had been established throughout the states west of the Rockies, the sales territory was extended to the markets farther east. The company now has offices in the principal cities of the west, and also in New York and Shikawaka, Japan.
