Chamber to Keep Out of Conflict on Lake Changes

"Let the sportsmen, if they choose, take a stand, but the chamber of commerce will pursue a policy of hands off."

This was the verdict this noon of the chamber board of directors on the question of the chamber appearing before President Coolidge's Coordinating Committee on Parks and Forests, and either opposing or favoring the inclusion of Diamond lake in Crater National park, at a hearing to be held at Diamond lake by the committee next month.

Directors took the stand, that it was a matter that should be handled by the Klamath sportsmen, and that the only part that the Klamath chamber should take, is to entertain the committee which is expected to arrive in Klamath Falls August 4.

A wire was sent by the chamber this afternoon asking the secretary of the committee whether the officials would approve a formal greeting by local citizens or whether an informal reception at the White Pelican hotel would be more suitable.

"Trail to Rail" Fete Is Boosted

Klamath should and will be well represented at the "Trail to Rail" fete in Eugene, celebrating the completion of the Cascade line, August 19 and 20.

Either Klamath Falls will have a special train or, in event there will not be enough, four or five cars will hook onto the special from San Francisco and southern points.

This was the report today at the chamber of commerce board of directors meeting, of the committee which is arranging for the visit of the Klamath delegation to Eugene.

"According to present arrangements, we would leave early on the morning of August 19 for Eugene, in order that we may see the new line during the day time," E. M. Bubb said this noon. "The delegation would remain in Eugene August 19 and 20 and on the night of August 21, return to Klamath Falls, arriving here on the morning of August 21."

"Klamath should have a large delegation. Eugene did her part for us when we staged a railroad celebration in the fall of 1923, and we should reciprocate."

Klamath Falls should increase its police force; unless the post office lobby can be patrolled intermittently throughout the night, the government will insist upon the lobby of the post office being closed during the night. This was the statement at the directors meeting of Postmaster John McCall.

"We have over ten thousand people in this city right now," one director said, "and we should have one policeman for every thousand population."
