Overland Whippet Sets New Mark in Automobile Circles

The consensus of opinion of the leading transportation circles is to be taken as a criterion of the new type of motor car. The Overland Whippet, one of the epoch making achievements of the entire automobile industry.

Amateurs Drive Chevs to Victory

Four privately owned Chevrolets, driven by amateur pilots, have scored winning places in automobile events during the past month.

On July 4, Robert Stewart, a California boy, won the sweepstakes cup against a big field in the half mile dash at Bear Valley, California. Just before the Bear Valley victory, R. J. Fraser Barbick, president of the Lake Arrowhead Chamber of Commerce, presented the winning cup to L. H. Lawrence, who took first honors with his Chevrolet in the annual Lake Arrowhead conversation run for amateur drivers.

Not satisfied with speed and economy laurels, Chevrolet stepped out and set a couple of cross-country records last month. Mason Jurgensen, youthful Pacific Coast motorist, drove his Chevrolet roadster from Los Angeles to Omaha in the fast time of 56 hours, 47 minutes. This not only establishes a new mark for the 2,029 mile run from the coast to the Nebraska metropolis, but also clips almost 2 hours off of the fastest train time between the two points.

Jurgensen was accompanied by Harold Boyers, an Omaha boy who served as relief driver. Their only stops were for fuel, hasty meals and one puncture. Another transcontinental record scored by Chevrolet was the run from Indianapolis to Los Angeles in 85 hours by Charles Barnes and L. F. Preston, both of Indianapolis. Local Garage Has New Machine for Grinding Valves

Installation of a new machine for grinding valves and valve seats by electric motor, is announced by the R. R. H. Garage. The machine is called the "Kwik-Way" System, and represents an investment of several hundred dollars. This machine is the only one in Klamath Falls, stated R. K. La Prairie, of the local automobile concern.

Advantages claimed for this new outfit are that the old and seasoned valves are ground and seated, instead of merely grinding the valve seat and installing new valves. This is said to eliminate the warping and twisting common to new valves, and the old ones have already been subjected to such heat that the "warp" is all taken out of them.

Accurate guides are provided on both the valve grinding mechanism and the part of the machine which grinds the seat, in the engine block, thus eliminating the chances for blunders that would result in leaky valves.

"Leaky valves are the cause of 85 per cent of motor troubles," declared Mr. La Prairie. "Yet only a very small fraction of the cars in use have perfect fitting valves. This is something the manufacturer of the car cannot prevent, when it is realized that new metal is almost invariably subject to some warping, just as a stove lid warps. It is evident that there must be thousands of car owners who are losing power and speed and satisfaction because of leaky valves."

Deputy District Attorney Joseph Ryan of Los Angeles today considered that all of the mystery connected with the disappearance and subsequent strange reappearance of Aimee Semple McPherson, evangelist, has been solved by new evidence found at Carmel, Monterey county. Ryan professed to be in possession of positive proof that Mrs. McPherson was in Carmel for a portion of the time that she was supposed to have been in Mexico in the hands of kidnapers, and that Kenneth G. Ormiston, friend of the evangelist, was in the Little Monterey bay town at the same time.

A dozen persons have identified pictures of Ormiston as the man who was so attentive to "Mrs. McIntyre" here, while three others have identified photographs of Mrs. McPherson as "Mrs. McIntyre."

She arrived at the cottage on May 19, the day following the disappearance of Mrs. McPherson, and stayed there about 10 days with Ormiston paying close attention to her needs, such as groceries and other necessities, Ryan says.

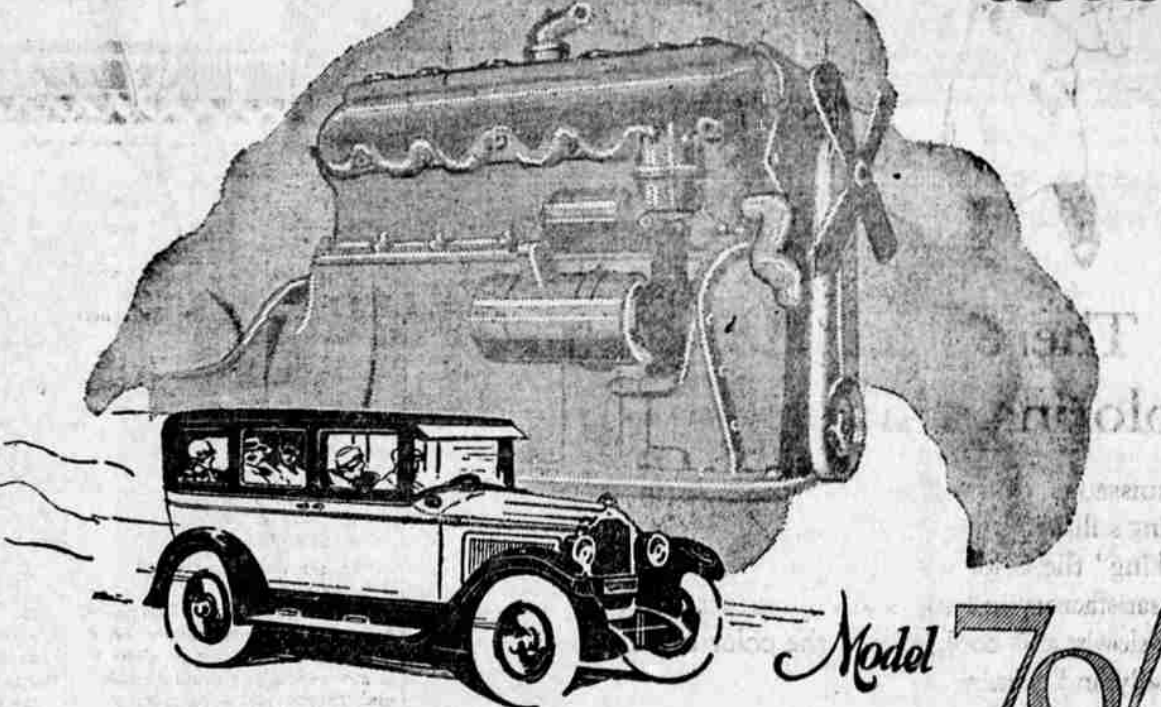
