Close Season Fee At Crater Lake Is Put Into Effect

MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 24.—For years past no automobile license fee has been charged for entrance to Crater lake national park between the Crater lake seasons, but a mandatory order has just been received from the national headquarters that an admission fee of \$1 the regular season fee, must be charged for each car entering the park for the first time during this year. This entrance fee is good for the remainder of the year.

This new rule, it is predicted, will bring to the national park coffers much additional revenue.
