TAX SITUATION IS DISCUSSED

Governor Patterson and Officials Hold Round Table Conference

STATE HOUSE, Salem, Ore., Jan. 25. (AP)—Governor I. L. Patterson held a round table conference on revenues last night with members of the special legislative tax investigating commission, and chairman of the house and senate common assessment and taxation. The proposed corporate excess and intangible taxes were the chief topic of discussion.

State Tax Commissioner Earl Fisher estimated that a tax of 16 mills on corporate excesses would yield about \$1,500,000. R. S. Hamilton maintained that the proposed rate was too high and would work a hardship on corporations competing with private individuals.

It developed in the discussion that if the various special sources of revenue of the state are taken into consideration the state is now levying taxes far beyond the limit set by the six per cent. increase clause in the constitution.

Kleiman Held On Bad Check Charge

Charged with issuing a check without funds, W. J. Kleiman, recently of Klamath Falls, was arrested yesterday in Medford and held by authorities there. Kleiman is charged with issuing a \$15 check to Lottie Merritt of this city for which he had no funds in the bank. He will be brought back to Klamath Falls to answer the charge.

IDAHO INJURES BASIN PROJECT

Checks Move to Secure Reservoir Site by Appropriating Water

BOISE, Idaho, Jan. 25. (AP)—The 19th session of the Idaho Legislature today authorized the governor to appropriate and hold in trust for the state all unappropriated water of Priest, Peck, Orville and Coeur d'Alene lakes.

The action prevents the use of these three northern Idaho lakes for the storage of irrigation water in the Columbia basin project. Because the Columbia basin project interests are believed to desire use of these lakes for reservoir sites, enactment of this bill is regarded as a definite blow to the project.

(Continued from page one) amount of chlorine to purify the water. I recommended that they increase the dosage.

"Is the statement true that you had investigated the river banks and buildings along the river bank of the Williamson river and found not one of them contaminating the stream?" Mr. McDaniel asked.

Contamination Reported

"That," the sanitary engineer said, "is a lie. It is true I investigated the buildings but I found that some buildings did contaminate the stream."

Mr. McDaniel stated in plain words that the article appearing in the Evening Herald last night was a true and unbiased report of the typhoid situation, and that the situation was more serious this morning by reason of the outbreak of another case of typhoid in the Chiloquin district.

The sanitary engineer stated that there was no purpose in avoiding the seriousness of the situation in Chiloquin. He said that the state public health office—ever since Dr. Stricker, secretary of the board had made a survey of the situation—was cognizant of the threat of a typhoid outbreak in Chiloquin and was not surprised when it did occur.

Need New Chlorine Plant

Mr. McDaniel appeared last night before the Chiloquin city council, informed them of the threat of a more serious epidemic and advised them to install a liquid chlorine plant to protect the citizens of Chiloquin. He said that the council seemed favorably disposed to this action.

"There are 11 cases of typhoid in the Chiloquin district," Mr. McDaniel said. "Dr. Rogers in his statement to the council said he believed that there were a number of more cases among the Indians that have not been located yet."

Much Concerned

Both Dr. Rogers and L. D. Arnold, superintendent of the Klamath Indian reservation are very much concerned over the typhoid situation. Dr. G. S. Newsom, medical director of the Klamath County Health unit said this morning.

"Dr. Rogers warned the Chiloquin council that unless remedial steps were taken the epidemic would reach serious proportions," the county health officer said.

Mr. McDaniel was accompanied by his investigation by Dr. Newsom.

Published Statement False

"The statements appearing in the morning publication do not reflect the true situation in Chiloquin," Dr. Newsom said. "The Evening Herald last night printed a true and unbiased account of the situation."

Asked, if in his judgment, the river was polluted, Mr. McDaniel answered in the affirmative.

"My investigations point directly to contamination from some buildings along the river bank above Chiloquin," he said.

Take It Or Leave, Board Tells Bouch

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 25. (AP)—Albert Bouch, former secretary to the principal of the Eugene high school and now placed in charge of a roll room at the high school by the board of education, was told last night by the board that he would either go to work on his new assignment or his pay would be stopped.

The action of the board followed recent trouble at the high school. Bouch was asked to submit his resignation, but refused to do this. He was then assigned to the roll room but refused to take the assignment.

REBELS ROUTED IN BATTLES

One Insurgent Chieftain Killed by Government Troops

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 25. (AP)—Twenty eight rebels and one chieftain were killed in various combats with federal forces. General Pablo Cabanas, heading a group of insurgents, attacked Santa Maria, state of Guerrero, but the small garrison defeated and dispersed the rebels, killing ten of them.

Simon Cortes and four of his followers were killed after capturing a part of the town of Santiago Del Monte, state of Michouacan when state guards defeated the band. Six rebels were killed at Apanica, six at Los Altos and two at Ayo Chico, during clashes with federal soldiers in the state of Jalisco.

McADOO TO RUN FOR PRESIDENT

NEW YORK, Jan. 25. (AP)—William G. McAdoo, who has said he is in New York on legal business, has been visited at his hotel by friends from several states, who have urged him to become a candidate for the democratic nomination for president, New York newspapers say today.

These friends are declared to have based their pleas on the argument that Mr. McAdoo's leadership in essential to assure success for the efforts of the "dry and progressive" elements of the party. A plan of campaign also is said to have been talked over.

The Times says that while nothing definite concerning whether he again would consent to seek the nomination could be had from Mr. McAdoo, the general impression of those who talked with him was that he would.

Major John S. Cohen, national committee man from Georgia; Austin E. McCullough, former state chairman of Pennsylvania, and Bernard M. Baruch, financier, are among those who have visited Mr. McAdoo.

Cess Pools To Be Regulated

An ordinance to protect the city from overflowing cess pools will be drawn up by City Attorney A. W. Schaupp and submitted to the council next Monday night. It was decided by the council last night.

The move was made at the suggestion of Mayor Tom Watters who told the council that complaints of poorly maintained cess pools constituted a health menace to the surrounding community, had been received by him.

Surfacing Project Nears Completion

Completion of the eight mile resurfacing project on the Midland State line market road from Shaw Bertram Lumber company to the northern edge of the lower Klamath lake marsh, is anticipated tomorrow by County Engineer Joseph S. Jensen.
