

## Fort Klamath Team Leading League Northern Division

All things considered, the Fort Klamath basketball team appears to be the leading contender for the championship of the Northern division of the Spud and Timber basketball league, with the rejuvenated Klamath Agency and Klamath Falls Cardinals as runners up.

The heavy and speedy Wood River valley quintet now leads the league with two wins and no losses. It defeated Klamath Agency last Saturday which established its superiority in that direction. But its second league victory, over the Cardinals, was chalked up only after one of the bitterest and most hard fought games ever seen on a Klamath basketball floor. Final score was 28 to 25 but three five minute overtime periods were necessary before the victor could be determined.

Personnel of the league leading team is J. J. Johnson, and Harold Mallory, forwards; J. H. Blomgren, center; R. E. Gordon and G. A. Page, guards; Loren Moon and Miles Matkey, substitutes.

In the southern division of the league, the Pelican Bay Lumber company quintet appears to be the strongest, but may be upset in its march toward the championship by a dark horse. The lumber company quintet are many veterans of former years who can be relied upon to come through with the necessary punch.

## FORMER FIGHT CHAMPIONS TO CLASH TONIGHT

### Berlenbach Slim Favorite in Bout With McTigue in New York

NEW YORK, Jan. 28. (AP)—Two former light heavyweight champions will clash tonight at Madison Square Garden. One seeking to clinch the impressive comeback at the expense of the former man who pitched him from the throne, the other aiming at the first headed summit of the golden peaked summit of the heavyweight division.

It is more than a year and a half since Mike McTigue yielded the 175 pound mantle to Paul Berlenbach. Later the debilitated champion went down to a knockout defeat at the hands of Jack Delaney, who subsequently won the title from Berlenbach. Since those defeats, McTigue has fought his way back to the ring with decisive victory over Johnny Hasko of Cleveland and three successive knockouts of King Solomon, Southern American heavyweight, Billy Vidarbeck and Soldier King.

Berlenbach rules a slight favorite over Mike in their twelve-round match tonight, but McTigue has been given generous backing.

## Arrangements Made to Get Reports Throughout the Day

Eyes of the west will be on Fort Klamath February 22 during the progress of the Fort Klamath-Crater Lake ski race and, realizing this, the committee in charge has made arrangements to dispatch bulletins throughout the day of the race telling of the race in its different stages.

The Klamath Telephone and Telegraph company will install a telephone in the community hall at Fort Klamath and reports of the race will be received there and disseminated from that point to newspapers and radio stations throughout the Pacific coast. A man will be stationed at each of four stations along the race course who will telephone in the conditions of the various contestants.

There is now 12 inches of snow at Fort Klamath, 28 inches at the upper end of the valley five miles north of the Fort, 60 inches at the south entrance of Crater Lake park and over 100 inches at the rim of Crater Lake.

Announcement of the ski race has already been broadcasted from the Oregonian broadcasting station in Portland, KGW. Assurance has been received by the committee that Pacific Coast broadcasting stations will broadcast the progress of the race beginning at 9:30 a. m. on the morning of February 22.

Snow conditions for good skiing have been much better this week, according to word from the committee today. Many have made excursions from Fort Klamath north as far as the park boundary.
