soon as this money is collected,
the new hospital will be built.
"Before selecting the hospital,
its location was investigated by
health authorities. They gave
assurance that the surrounding
community was not endangered
by proximity to the hospital.

Notified To Vacate
"A short time ago, the city
was notified that the present
isolation hospital—also on Ore-
gon avenue—would have to be
vacated. A council committee
and I undertook to select an-
other location. We combed the
town from one end to the other
and finally selected another
house on Oregon avenue. It
was the only feasible location
available.

"We did not wish to place a
hardship on Oregon avenue resi-
dents. An isolation hospital
had to be selected immediately
and we picked the only location
which could serve this purpose.
"The plain truth of the mat-
ter is that wherever the pest
house was located, we would re-
ceive a complaint. At best, it
is an embarrassing position for
the administration.

Protestants Could Enjoin
"There are two courses open
for protestants to follow. One
is to follow the steps of the
council committee and pick out
another location for the hospital.
If it is suitable, I have no doubt
but what the council will accept
it. The other is to go to
court and take out an injunction
against the city using the hos-
pital. In that event the mat-
ter will come before circuit
court and that agency will de-
cide whether or not the city is
within its rights.

"Candidly, I believe we have
done the best that could be done
under the circumstances. I
hope the people of Oregon ave-
nue will see it in our light
and in view of the fact that it
is—according to health au-
thorities—not a health hazard,
and only a temporary affair,
let the matter rest.

"However, if the Oregon ave-
nue residents can suggest a
solution, the city administration
will be only too glad to con-
sider it and follow it if feasi-
ble."
