19 PASSENGER
STAGE BOUGHT
BY C. S. KINGBus Operator Determined
to Increase Facilities
With Business Growth

So rapidly has business been growing on the Klamath Falls-Chiloquin Stage line that C. S. King, the owner, today placed a new 19-passenger modern White bus on the line. Mr. King bought the bus in Portland and drove it through by the Pacific Highway and Ashland Thursday and Friday. He says that he chose the Willamette valley route instead of the Columbia River and Dalles highway, which is about 27 miles shorter and has better grades, because the Pacific highway is more certain to be open in the stormy weather. He was advised that present rock slides occasionally delay cars in one or in the gorge of the Columbia two places for one to three hours until crews of trouble shooters, which are kept at dangerous places, clear the slides away. Travel was good via Ashland.

Second Bus

This is the second bus that Mr. King had added to his stage line since he purchased it in November. He has several high-power autos with which he transfers passengers to the logging and lumber camps on the Chiloquin end of the route. He is modernizing and standardizing his service so as to be able to handle in a creditable way the rush of people that will come in the spring.

As he came through Salem, Mr. King met representatives of other stage lines in Oregon who have a bill in the legislature which proposes to issue to thoroughly equipped and scheduled stage lines certificates of convenience and necessity. Lee Davis, veteran stage driver, rode through to Chiloquin as the guest of Mr. King. He wants to look over the much-talked of Klamath country.

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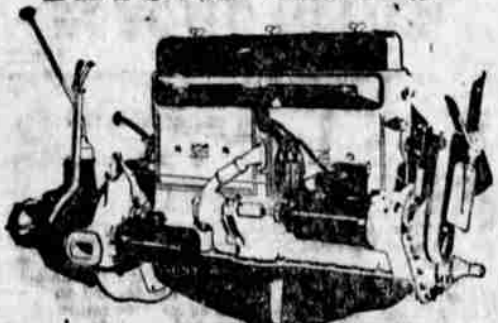
