Steno Is Homespinner

EASTCOTE, Middlesex, Eng., Jan. 29 (AP)—In a quaint little house in a crooked lane of this old village, real "homespun" are woven on an ancient loom by Rosetta Collins, who says she "escaped" from crowded London where she was a stenographer.

Her workshop is a one-woman mill. Miss Collins buys wool from nearby farmers; it is washed, carded, spun and woven, and then made up into sports clothes for men and women. For twenty years she has studied her art as a hobby. Now she teaches others how to make "homespun," a craft that is rapidly disappearing.

AN interesting motif running through some of the newest coiffures is that of the high dressed forelock, which is waved to stand a little above the rest of the hair, then either falling forward on the forehead or back, at the front-side, over the other straight hair. Josef Hofmann To Play For Violinist
NEW YORK (AP)—Josef Hofmann, the pianist, will be an accompanist at a public concert for the first time in his career when he plays with Lea Luboshutz, Russian violinist, here January 30.

Hofmann will play his own arrangement for the piano of a violin concerto by Bruch. Miss Luboshutz, who was court violinist to the czar before the revolution, and the pianist met on the liner "Majestic" two years ago when both were returning from Europe to America. This is her first concert season in the United States.

Wagnerian Festival Planned At Bayreuth
BAYREUTH, Bavaria, (AP)—Birthplace of "The Ring of the Nibelungen" and of "Parsifal," the Wagner Festspielhaus here will celebrate its fiftieth anniversary this summer.

The home of Wagnerian drama was opened in 1876. Frau Cosima Wagner and her daughter, the actress, will celebrate the anniversary festival a year to make a worthy series of performances possible. "It will be opened July 19 with 'Tristan and Isolde' and closed August 29 with 'Parsifal'."

Latife Hanoum Secluded

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 29. (AP)—Latife Hanoum, divorced wife of President Kemal, is living in a complete and even mysterious retirement, reminiscent of the bygone seclusion of Turkish women. During the year since the divorce, she has remained invisible in the Constantinople home of her father, a wealthy merchant. She has not only refused to speak one word for publication but has even consistently denied admittance to family friends and members of Turkish society.

Changes In Lingerie

There is a marked change in English lingerie fashions. The latest designs demand that before everything else "undies" should be feminine, even to the extent of the return of that much despised garment, the petticoat. Boudoir caps also are creeping back to favor. Yokes, which have so long been featured on frocks, are now seen on under things. Crepe de Chine is a favorite material. Nightgowns are being made with square necks. Lace and scallops are used to get the "feminine" effect. Pink still retains its superiority as a favored color.

Cooking for Girls

LONDON (AP)—Girls should become cooks instead of maids, believes Dr. Elizabeth Sloan Chesser, one of England's best known physicians. Speaking before a Health Society, Dr. Chesser urged the organization to popularize cooking among the girls. They should be a domestic science class in every school, she declared.

BUTTERFLY OF CANTON SLAIN

Favorite of San Francisco Chinatown Murdered With Barber Shears

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 29. (AP)—Ham Leong, the butterfly of Little Canton, is dead by the hand of some slinking murderer. She was found in her silky, perfumed boudoir today with a pair of thin barber's shears thrust deep into her chest. All of her rich jewels were gone.

The killing of Ham Leong was no ordinary murder. She was the best protected woman in Chinatown because she was the favorite of a tong. A big Cantonese gunman paddled behind her wherever she went on the streets and guarded the door of her boudoir. But some wrathful nemesis slipped by him last night, armed with a pair of barber's shears.

The Spelling Bee

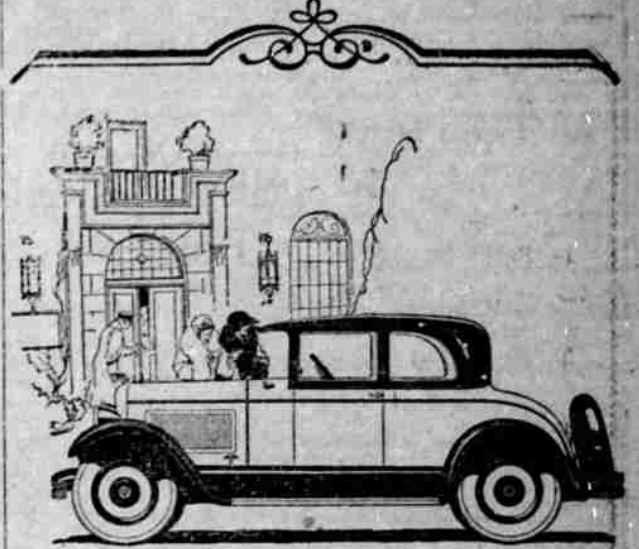
Spokane Spokesman-Review: Spelling is becoming largely a lost art in the country—not only for sign painters and cartoonists, who seem to spell under a special dispensation at all times—but for the rank and file of the people of the land. Recognizing this fact and deploring it, the Oklahoma City Times undertook to improve the spelling of school children in that city.

This was done by reviewing the old-time Friday afternoon spelling bee in the grades, inclusive. A selected list of 225 words was prepared. The pupils were given four weeks to study them before being asked to spell a list of fifty of them in the actual tests. The plan was not to find the best individual speller in the city, a method frowned on by pedagogues, but to improve

the average spelling in each room. The results were successful in raising the Oklahoma City average for the United States in the same grades. Where the national average runs from 75 to 79 per cent, the Oklahoma City grade school spelling averages ran from 93.6 per cent to 99.9 per cent virtually perfect.

The Times has sponsored these spelling bees for four years. Next year it will include the Junior high and high schools. It is a fact that the study of spelling virtually ceases with entrance into the high schools, as high school students electing subjects give "thumbs down" to spelling as not being fun.

Only three Oklahoma City grade school pupils averaged below 80 per cent for the entire school pupils of thirty-five schools and 10,889 pupils.
